Meeting the many needs of some 400,000 Roman Catholics in the 12 counties of our 'diocese' requires many people working together.

The bishop relies on the talents and skills of his Pastoral Center staff to help him respond to those needs.

In the day-to-day ad-ministration of his ministry as bishop, Bishop Matthew H. Clark is assisted by a priest and lay secretary, who work together to coordinate his correspondence and calendar of 'appointments. Their tasks include arranging the yearlong Confirmation Program for Bishop Clark, Bishop Joseph L. Hogan and Bishop Dennis W. Hickey. They also make all meeting and travel arrangements for the bishops and maintain the official diocesan records and files. Each week the bishop's office responds to hundreds of written and telephone requests.

The priest secretary serves as information officer in all . contacts with the news media. He also prepares and directs all sacramental celebrations over which the bishop presides.

The bishop's own office team serves as a channel of communication to free the bishop as much as possible for -personal pastoral presence around the diocese.

The bishop decided to close the seminary in early January, citing shrinking enrollment, rapid tuition increases, and difficulty in maintaining very large old buildings as reasons for his actions.

In his statement announcing the seminary's closing, Bishop Clark said, This decision, while not an easy on to make, is, I believe, the best decision in the light of all the circumstances of our times.


