Many members of the Roman Catholic Church are caught in a dilemma. We want to remain loyal to our church but find dissatisfaction in the way current problems are handled. We must seek out and find acceptable terms to bring all forces to agreement regarding the matter of women priests. It is especially difficult for some students here at St. Agnes to accept the current decision from Rome, because here, we are encouraged and trained to be participants, planners and leaders in

education, community, national, and international affairs.

The hopefully temporary decision restricting women is inhibiting our religious growth and potential not only as women, but as Christians. Spiritual maturity is not exclusive. The altar is a place of unity symbolizing perfect harmony, overcoming all discord.

From the Bible, we know that Jesus accepted women as people, as illustrated in Matthew 12:46-50. Jesus' friends, in this passage, inform Jesus that his mother and his brothers are arriving. ## Sports Who's Who

**BASEBALL** — Mike Battaglia smashed a two-run homer and added a double and a triple to lead Cardinal Mooney to a 12-3 win over host Franklin. Bob O'Meara struck out nine and walked only one for the victory.

Craig Cusick pitched a three-hitter and Scott Spencer went 3-for-4 with a home run to lead McQuaid to an 11-0 romp over visiting Edison Tech. Mike Doyle and Dave Condello each had three runs batted in.

Ed Wedow hurled a one-hitter as Aquinas edged Monroe, 1-0. Tony Alomar walked in the sixth inning, stole second, then scored on Steve Buttons' single.

Frank Fiannaca drove in three runs with two singles as Bishop Kearney downed East High, 9-3, at East.

McQuaid trounced Greece Athena, 10-3, in a non-league game at

McQuaid. Dan Ryan slugged a two-run homer in the first inning and Scott Spencer hit a three-run homer in the third to pace the Knights.

Bob Magee doubled and scored on an error in the fourth inning, breaking a 3-3 tie and sparking Aquinas to a 7-3 win over Cardinal Mooney. Tony Alomar slugged two triples and scored twice for the Little Irish.

Dave Condello singled to score Mike Doyle with two outs in the eighth inning to give McQuaid a 4-3 win over Bishop Kearney at McQuaid. Peter Palermo was the winning pitcher, fanning six and walking four. Ray LeChase had two hits and two runs batted in for the Knights.

Cardinal Mooney rallied for six runs in the sixth inning to defeat McQuaid, 6-4, at Silver Stadium. Zach Rivera went 3-for-4 and batted in three runs, in-

cluding the go-ahead run. Sophomore Kevin Lynd was the winning pitcher, striking out nine. Mooney is now 9-2 league and 15-2 overall, while McQuaid is 10-1 league, 15-3 overall.

Bob Magee had three hits, including a two-run single in the first inning to lead Aquinas to a 5-3 win over Bishop Kearney at Silver Stadium. John DiNardo was the winning pitcher.

McQuaid pitcher Peter Palermo, normally a starter, came on in relief to lift the Knights over Marshall, 8-6. Palermo came on in the bottom of the fifth with the score tied, 6-6, and runners on second and third. He proceeded to strike out five of the eight men he faced. Catcher Mike Hebert was 2-for-3, including an RBI double in the second inning.

Steve Buttons laid down a suicide squeeze bunt to score Todd Battaglia with the

winning run in a 3-1 Aquinas victory over Charlotte.

Jim Schmidt smashed two home runs and drove in five runs to lead Bishop Kearney over Jefferson, 14-4, at Jefferson. Frank Fiannaca ripped a two-run homer for the Kings.

**TRACK** — McQuaid's Dan Geen won the shot put and discus events to lead the Knights to a 95-45 victory over Aquinas and the Division I title. Jed Hanna was also a double winner for McQuaid, in the 400- and 800-meter runs. Scott Lipa had three first-place finishes, in the 110 hurdles, the 400 hurdles and the triple jump.

Dan Ercalano won the 100- and 200-meter dash events as Bishop Kearney beat Cardinal Mooney, 74-45, at East High.

Elmira Notre Dame's

discus relay team took first place in the 18th annual Aquinas Relays last week at the University of Rochester. John Nichols, Jim Nichols and John Von Hagen combined for a distance of 411 feet, seven inches, a new meet record. McQuaid's discus team finished second. Bishop Kearney's distance relay team of Matt Abate, John Maring, Greg Rapp and Jim Oberst won with a time of 10:29.9, also a meet record. Brooklyn Tech, of New York City's Public School Athletic League (PSAL), captured top overall honors.

Division I leader McQuaid thumped Monroe, Division II leader, 91-55, in a battle of track unbeatens at Edison. Dan Geen won the shot put and the discus, and Scott Lipa took the 110 high hurdles and 400 intermediate hurdles for the Knights. McQuaid won 13 of 18 events and clinched their first City-Catholic league title in 10 years.

Greg Butkowsky rallied to defeat Al Kusak, 4-6, 6-2, 6-1, and lift Cardinal Mooney over Aquinas, 3-2, in a City-Catholic tennis league match at Aquinas. In a later match, McQuaid shut out Cardinal Mooney, 5-0, at McQuaid. Chris Tulte beat Butkowsky, 6-0, 6-2, in first singles to lead McQuaid.

Bishop Kearney scored 11 times in the first inning and coasted to an 18-3 victory over Mercy. Beth Supple had three runs batted in and pitcher Beth Buddenbeck hurled four no-hit innings, struck out two and scored twice.

Bishop Kearney defeated Penfield, 8-4, in a non-league lacrosse game at Kearney. Matt Reister, Matt Hand and Tom Viola each scored two goals for the Kings and Rich Spencer and Jim Pinkas added single tallies.
