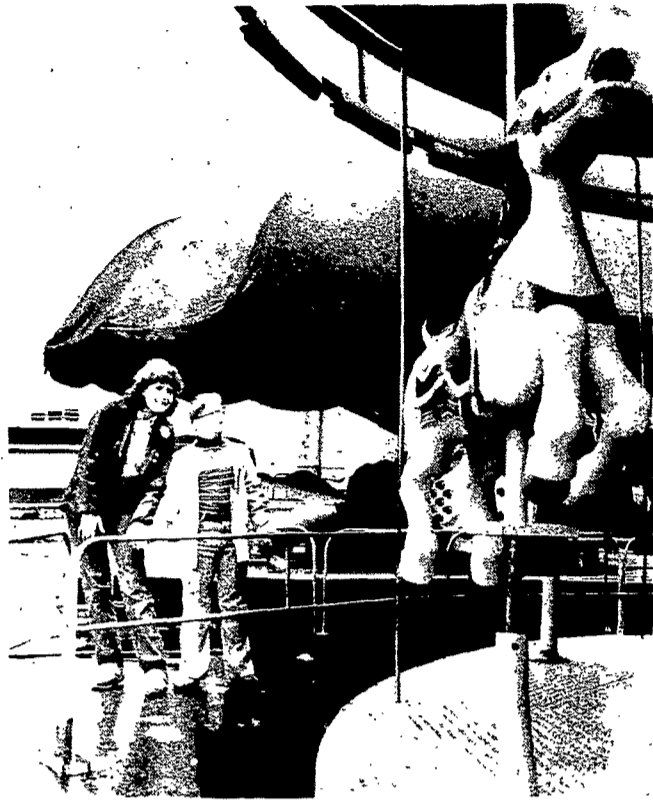

Students Take French Tour

For the first time in Aquinas history, according to school sources, the French class students joined the students from the College du Sacre-Coeur in Annonay, France. Students from both schools are under the direction of the Basilian fathers whose order originated in Annonay.

Last September, the students began corresponding with each other. This was accomplished through their two teachers, Thomas Rosica, a Basilian associate from Rochester, teaching in Annonay this year, and his mother, Mrs. RoseAnn Rosica, a foreign language teacher at Aquinas.

When the Aquinas students arrived in Paris, they were met by the French students. The group then spent eight days traveling throughout Paris and much of northern France. Together they enjoyed a play at the Comedie Francaise, the opera "Arabella," a boat trip around the Ile de la Cite on the bateau mouche, and a trip through Normandy.

The group then journeyed by bus to the Ardeche country in the Rhone River valley of Southern France.

Upon their arrival in Annonay, the students and teachers were met by the families of their correspondents and then lodged in their homes. Each day they attended classes together from 8 a.m. until noon.

One of the unusual things the Aquinas students remarked about was the unusually long lunch periods. Unlike the usual 27 minutes at Aquinas for lunch, they had a two-hour six-course meal — called lunch.

School resumed at 2 p.m. and ended at 5 p.m. The day seemed much longer to the Aquinas students. The general consensus was that they much preferred the American school

day because it gave much more free time after school for activities.

Some of the things most remembered by the Aquinas students were the palaces of the kings — Versailles and Fontainebleau. Remembered too were the buildings of antiquity such as those seen in the 13th century town of Moret-sur-Loing, and the buildings of Chartres.

Never to be forgotten were the preserved bodies of the saints: St. Catherine Laboure in the Chapelle of the Miraculous Medal on the Puc du Bac in Paris; and that of St. Catherine Couderc (foundress of the Cenacle Sisters) which lies in the Chapelle at the top of the mountain in La Louvesc.

They will also treasure the memory of the pilgrimage to the grotto at Lourdes along with some 12,000 faithful, to give homage to the Mother

in Heaven. Last but not least, they will all remember the wonderful friends they made at Sacre-Coeur, along with all their families.

These new friendships are but a beginning. This summer, one of the Annonayens will journey to Rochester to spend a month in an American family setting. In September, another student of Sacre-Coeur will arrive to attend St. John Fisher College. Next year the students of Sacre-Coeur will visit Rochester in a group.

The trip was a means by which the students could come to better appreciate and understand the culture and language of the people of a foreign country. As young ambassadors to France, the students accomplished just that, and proved that the young people of today are the hope for tomorrow — a hope that perhaps there could be peace between nations.

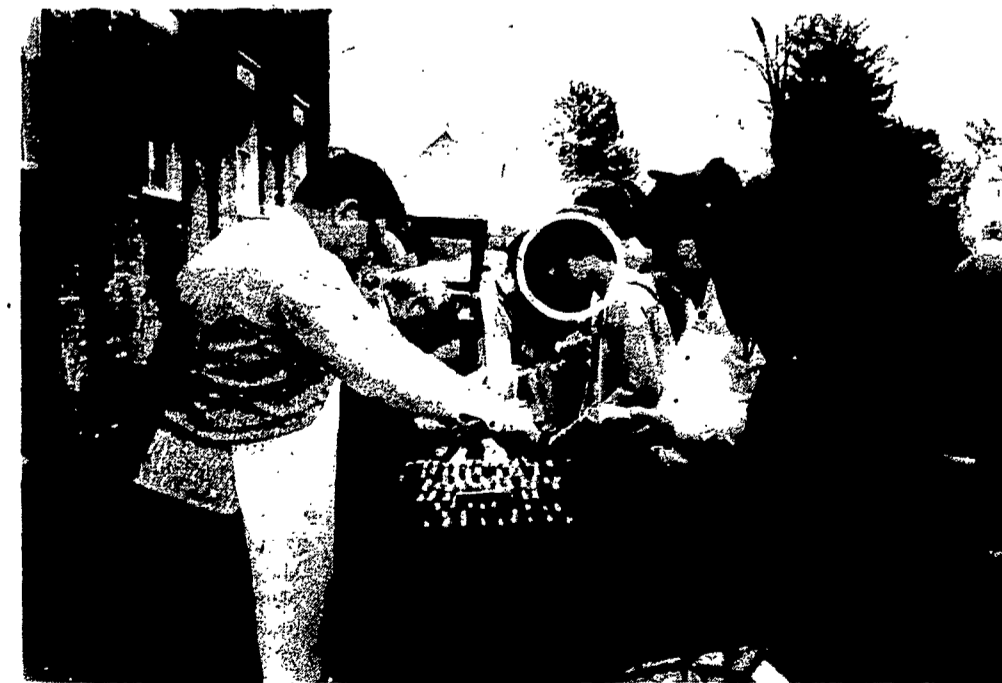
