A "Christian Growth Seminar" featuring video-tape recordings of eight nationally known leaders in the Catholic charismatic renewal will be held from 6 p.m., Friday, June 12 to 10 p.m., Saturday, June 13 at St. Agnes High School.

The program is co-sponsored by Charismatic Renewal Services of South Bend, Ind., and the local Catholic Charismatic Renewal Office.

The theme of the event is "How to Pray, Study, and Obey the Bible."

Father John Bertolucci, nationally known preacher and evangelist, will be the on-screen host for the program. Also featured will be Father George Montague, Kevin and Dorothy Ranaghan and others.

Word for Sunday

The Gifts From the Holy Spirit

Sunday's Readings: (R3) Jn. 20:19-23. (R1) Acts 2:1-11. (R2) Cor. 12:3-7, 12-13.

Next Sunday celebrates one of the greatest events in the life of the Church — the coming of the Holy Spirit upon her.

This might be a good occasion to write briefly about the gifts of the Holy Spirit. (R2)

The Holy Spirit gives two sets of gifts: the Seven Gifts, always mentioned at the time of confirmation; and the Nine Spiritual Gifts, or charisms, so familiar to charismatic groups.

These two sets of gifts differ. The Seven Gifts are given to everyone baptized, for their own personal sanctification. The nine are given only to some for the common good — to upbuild the Church.

These gifts are alike in that both give an experiential knowledge of God and the things of God. Experiential knowledge differs from notional knowledge. Notional knowledge is head knowledge, like knowing the Apostles Creed. Experiential knowledge is heart knowledge, felt knowledge: "Were not our hearts burning inside us as he (Christ) talked to us?"

For example, I can know about mountain climbing by reading (notional knowledge); or better still, by actually climbing a mountain (experiential knowledge).

Experiential knowledge is the far better, because it comes to man not just through his head, but also through his feelings. It is a better knowledge, because it addresses the whole man: his mind, his heart, his feelings.

Because the seven gifts are given to all the baptized, and our space is limited, we shall consider only these seven.

They may be viewed from two angles:

State Champs!

The sports tradition of the Basilian Fathers goes beyond teams from Aquinas Institute. Father Ronald Schwenzer, CSB, an Aquinas and St. John Fisher graduate and now principal of Bishop O'Dowd High School, Oakland, Ca., reported recently that the school basketball team won the state title.

Father Schwenzer is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Schwenzer of Webster. Also teaching at Bishop O'Dowd is Rochester native Father Richard Wahl, CSB, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Wahl.

From our side, they are the equipment God gives us at baptism to pick up the actions of the Holy Spirit within us. Some Church fathers likened them to the sails of a ship, catching the wind.

From God's side, however, the seven are the actions of the Holy Spirit within us. God loves us, you know. He wants to be one with us, as are bride and groom. But how can this ever be unless He Himself gets involved?

To arrive at this union with God is a lifelong process. It involves getting to know God, and then changing in order to become worthy, so to speak, of so great a spouse.

This lifelong process goes something like this: the Holy Spirit acts within us — He touches us, we feel His presence! Equipped with the seven gifts at baptism, we pick up these "felt" actions (which impart a growing awareness sometimes of God, sometimes of creatures, sometimes of decisions to be made). These actions of God evoke reactions, gradually effecting a change in us of heart and attitudes (the beatitudes), which prepare us for union with God.

Order is the first law of heaven, and there is order in God's actions. First, the gift of Wonder and Awe generates a desire for God in preference to the world; we become "poor in spirit." The gift of Courage puts heart into us by creating a "hunger and thirst for holiness." Obstacles are hurdled. But life is full of decisions as well as of obstacles. The gift of Right Judgment guides us in choosing right and in becoming "merciful." By this time, the fatherliness of God begins to dawn (Reverence) and we begin to relate to Him as a little child — we become "lowly."

The last three gifts prepare us for union with God. We cannot love what we do not know. So Knowledge uncovers the nakedness of creatures and causes us to "mourn" for having preferred these in the past to God. The gift of Understanding helps us so to penetrate the mysteries of faith that we become "single-minded." At last we are ready to embrace God. He "kisses" us so to speak (the gift of Wisdom). Such great peace inundates the heart that we desire this for all others — we become "peacemakers."

Too bad space prevents our developing these gifts and the resulting beatitudes further. However, it is enough if this brief resume of God's plan for us impels us to pray daily for the Holy Spirit to come to us with His sevenfold gifts.
