Administrator, 4 Pastors Named

The appointments of four pastors and one administrator were announced last week.

Father George Gauthier, associate pastor of St. John's in Clyde, has been named pastor of St. Joseph's in Cayuga. Father Paul Cloonan, associate at St. James in Rochester, takes on the triple pastorate of St. Bernard's, Scipio Center/St. Hilary's, Genoa/St. Isaac Jogues, Fleming. He succeeds Father Robert M. Egan who is taking the pastorate of St. Anthony's, Groton. Father William Amann, pastor of Our Lady of Mercy, will administer the parish of St. Cecilia's in Elmira. Father Thomas Erdle has been named pastor of a deaf parish which will be housed in the lower church of Old St. Mary's, downtown.

Father Erdle, who has long held title as chaplain to Rochester's deaf community, was ordained in 1955. He served associate pastorates at Holy Redeemer, Holy Ghost and St. James churches. In 1967-68 he went on sabbatical to New York University and on his return was named to the diocesan deaf apostolate. that year also taking the chaplaincy of the National Institute for the Deaf on the Rochester Institute of Technology campus, In addition, Father Erdle is chaplain at the Rochester School for the Deaf. Among his professional associations are the Monroe County Association of the Hearing

Impaired, the Rochester Health Association, and the Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf.

Father Amann, who has served as associate, then copastor and then as pastor of Our Lady of Mercy, was ordained in 1954. He first served as assistant at St. Andrew's Parish, then Holy Trinity Parish in Webster. In 1962, he began a three-year chaplaincy at Bishop Kearney High School.

Father Egan, also ordained in 1954, was first assigned to Blessed Sacrament Church in Rochester. He has subsequently served at St. Mary's, Waterloo, Immaculate Conception, Rochester; St. Jerome's, East Rochester; and St. John, Clyde/St. Patrick. Savannah.

Father Cloonan, another member of the class of 1954.

has served at Holy Rosary, Rochester; St. Philip Neri, Rochester; St. James, Waverly; Blessed Sacrament, Rochester; Assumption, Fairport; St. Michael's, Rochester, Our Lady of Good Counsel, Rochester; St. Mary's, Canandaigua; St. Ann's Home/The Heritage, and St. Patrick's, Victor.

Father Gauthier, a 1959 ordinand, has served at St. Mary's, Waterloo, St. Andrew's, Rochester; Our-Mother of Sorrows, Greece; St. Charles Borromeo, Elmira Heights; St Patrick's, Mt. Morris; St. Anne, Palmyra and St. Patrick, Seneca Falls. In addition, Father Gauthier served several years in Secular Mission/Human Development work and from 1971 to 1974 was a member of the board of directors of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference.

K. of C. Joins **Nestle Boycott**

Heeding Bishop Matthew H. Clark's call for a boycott of Nestle Co. products, the Finger Lakes Chapter of the Knights of Columbus has urged "all Knights and their families to support the boycott ... until such time as the sale and promotion of infant formula in underdeveloped countries . . . is discontinued."

The Finger Lakes Chapter includes the more than 20 local councils of the K. of C.

Bishop Clark in a statement printed in the May 6 Courier-Journal announced his support of the boycott and urged "people of conscience to study this matter carefully and to join me in this effort by not purchasing Nestle's products, by writing, as individuals and groups, to the Nestle Company informing them of your decision."

The Finger Lakes chapter announced its support in a letter signed by George F. Fay, recording secretary, and sent to Arthur Fuerer, president of the company based in Vevey, Switzerland.

In addition to citing the leadership of Bishop Clark, a "Brother Knight," the chapter mentioned that the World Health Organization has requested the discontinuance of such sales.

The chapter stated that "a boycott would be a forceful way of expressing our concern and supporting our Bishop."

The diocesan Justice and Peace Commission, in endorsing the boycott, stated that "American and European based multinational corporations are promoting bottle-feeding in developing countries in order to maintain profits from their infant formula divisions, following the decline of birth rates in the industrialized world."

The commission said that the proper use of the formula "requires sterilization of the water, bottle and nipple," that contamination "may result in a severe bacterial infection of the intestine, leading to malabsorption, dehydration and death. Among poor people who do not have pure drinking water, sterile technique for safe bottlefeeding is next to impossible."

The commission said that "mother's milk can provide the baby with a readily available source of nourishment for four to six months without supplement. It is convenient, nutritious, economical and safe."

The commission scored "multinational companies" for leading mothers to believe, through advertising and promotional campaigns, that ' formula is best. In addition to the safety factor, the commission cited the expense of the formula, stating that one baby on formula would consume 40 to 60 percent of the family budget.

INFACT, a network of 250 chapters throughout the world, claims that Nestle "controls about half of the

Priests Council Elects By Michael Groden

The diocesan Priests Council elected new officers during the final meeting of the year, last week. Father Robert O'Neill was elected president, succeeding Father John Norris. Father Joseph Jankowiak will replace Father O'Neill as council vicepresident. Father Eugene Weis will serve as secretary, replacing Father Walter Wainwright.

Age block election winners were also introduced. They are Fathers Thomas Brennan, Raymond Heisel, John Hayes, Paul Murley, John Hempel, James Moynihan, Robert O'Neill, Frank Falletta, Donald Schwab and Robert Werth.

In his closing remarks as council president Father Norris expressed his gratitude to the council for its constant support. Father Norris chose not to run for re-election citing an increased workload at his parish, Church of the Assumption, Fairport.

Bishop Clark also asked the council "to think of ways to improve the spiritual life of the priests in the diocese." He said the spiritual lives of the priests should be considered very important and asked the council for suggestions on how to best improve that aspect of priestly life.
