Dear Parish Liturgy Committees:

This past spring I began a study of parish liturgy committees. (You probably remember the yellow form with all the questions!) This study was begun for many reasons: (1) to update the Liturgy Office's mailing lists; (2) to attempt to discover the state of affairs of liturgy committees throughout the diocese; (3) to assess the needs of committees in order that we might design programs that would be useful to you. Your responses were most helpful and will certainly enter into any planning that we do for future programs.
