

Changes at Aquinas Await 60th Class

Freshman boys attending Aquinas Institute this fall will be the 60th class to enter the Dewey Avenue campus. The Class of 1985 numbers 150 students.

Three Basilians are among the faculty newly appointed to the school. Father John Ward comes from Andean High School in Merrillville, Ind., and will teach mathematics. Charles McLean, a graduate

of the University of Michigan, is a Basilian Associate and will teach English. Father Richard Kinsky is in charge of public relations and student recruitment in the Development Office.

Some changes have occurred in the lay faculty. Richard Parrinello will teach business, and replaces Nick Teta as head football coach.

David Kleehammer is the new varsity soccer coach. Mary Beth Moore, a recent graduate of Nazareth College, will teach English.

Annette Truby and Stephen Ward plan to direct an expanded outreach program for Aquinas seniors, involving them as volunteers in social ministries such as the St. Joseph House of Hospitality, St. Ann's Home, and the Baden Street Settlement House. Speakers from these and other social justice ministries will be invited to address the seniors in theology classes.

A newly refinished gymnasium floor will greet the physical education classes and the Aquinas basketball teams. On the athletic field behind the school, a new electronic scoreboard for football, baseball and soccer is being readied for the first games this fall — the gift of a friend of Aquinas.

Aquinas Band Boosters are holding their first meeting at 7:45 p.m., Sept. 14. Parents of new band members are urged to attend. Band members will again be selling dinner/theatre coupon books in a fund-raising project.

Aquinas Parents Association officers and the Aquinas faculty will be introduced to parents by president Pat Bell and vice president Jack Hoover at the first meeting of the APA, to be held at the end of September.

Enrollment Up At Mercy High

Enrollment at Our Lady of Mercy High School is up again this year, a trend that began last year and seems to be continuing as the school opens in September with 840 students.

Sister Mary Bonaventure, school principal, attributes the increased enrollment to a strong recruitment program headed by the guidance department. This year, Mercy has enrolled more students from many different areas, including Canandaigua, Newark and West Bloomfield. There is also an increase from the parochial schools.

This year, many Mercy students will be enrolled in programs ranging from basic subjects to the honors and

College Credit courses. Many students will be taking advantage of the BOCES program out of BOCES I in Fairport. Mercy girls have signed up for courses in such areas as police science, commercial photography, computer programming and cosmetology. These students spend a half day at BOCES and a half day at Mercy.
