

Notre Dame Enrollment Rises

Elmira — On Sept. 9, Notre Dame High School will welcome 152 new ninth graders, 19 new upperclassmen, three new teachers, and a new chaplain. The new enrollments will bring the student population to 545, an increase over last year.

The school will welcome Father Vincent McDonough, SJ, as resident chaplain. He will be teaching and counseling as well as being a leader in the sacramental program in the school. He has most recently been stationed at McQuaid Jesuit High School in Rochester and has had experience at other Jesuit high schools and seminaries.

Boston College, St. Bonaventure's and Notre Dame University are the schools where the new faculty members received their bachelor degrees. John Olisky, Mrs. Judy McInerney and Mrs. Amanda Buckley will be the new teachers. All of them will teach full-time in the theology department.

One of the new upperclassmen is Constanza Contreras, a Mexican exchange student. She will be residing with Mr. and Mrs. William Roberts of Maple Avenue. Constanza comes to the United States through the Education Foundation for Foreign Study Program. She is looking forward to learning another language, English, that will help her in communicating with the world's people.

When the students return in September, they will see the newly completed tennis courts. These courts will be dedicated in the fall and will be used for the girls' tennis team coached by Jack Lowman and the boys' tennis team coached by Sister Beatrice Curran. The courts have enhanced the campus and will be used for the physical education program as well as inter-scholastic athletic competition.

In addition to the newly formed girls' tennis team, Notre Dame will field a boys' JV soccer team. The

team will be coached by Dr. Fred Lucas, a Notre Dame graduate.

Notre Dame football will have a new look under the direction of coach Mike D'Aloisio when the team joins the newly formed Sullivan Trail and Southern-Tier League.

The teams may be traveling farther, but they will be playing more equal competition. The boys are looking forward to a very good season.

There will be some new looks in the academic program at Notre Dame. In the business department, the school will pilot a new program for the State Education Department: Keyboarding and Communication. It will be taught by Sister Dolores Ann Stein who piloted a program last year, Business Dynamics, which the school will continue to offer.

In the math department, Sister Mary Joachim will introduce Course III of the new integrated program.

The seniors will have a more comprehensive theology course, entitled "Toward a Christian Life Style." The focus will be on the single life, as well as on the religious life and the married life.

The staff is looking forward to a good academic year, the deepening of a faith community and the continuing of a spirit-filled student body.

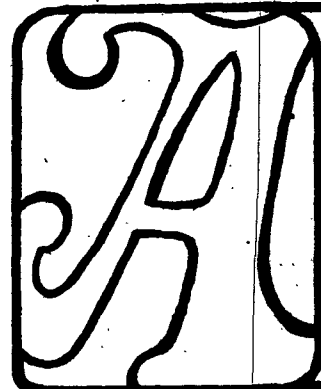
