Bishop Matthew H. Clark will be celebrant of the Mass, sponsored by the St. Thomas More Lawyers Guild.

Bishop Kelly is a Rochester native and his father, Thomas A. Kelly, was an attorney. His great-uncle, Father John W. Kelly, served in Spencerport, Victor, Auburn and Ithaca.

Prior to his appointment to his present NCCB leadership post, Bishop Kelly was associate general secretary of the conference and secretary to the apostolic delegate. He has published several articles on Canon Law and is named in Who's Who in America.

without pressure. It is not just a one-to-one meeting between priest and "convert," but a gathering of inquirers, catechists, parish staff members and parishioners for what the general instruction of the RCIA calls a "friendly exchange." (No. 11)

This "friendly exchange" is the heart of the Pre-Catechumenate. Everyone — even Snoopy — has a story to tell. It is about one's journey of faith: how each one has discovered and experienced the working of God in life, how one has been brought to this moment of inquiry and belief. There are no wrong answers here, only the "friendly exchange" of the rich stories of God's wonderful works in the lives of His wonderful people.

Then, in these Pre-Catechumenate meetings, the story of the People of God is told, the story of God's wonderful works through the ages. His most wonderful work, the life and death and resurrection of Christ, is narrated. All this so that the inquirers might recognize that their story is like the story of many others, that they might in turn find a sense of belonging and that their search has not been in vain. This mutual story-telling will also help their initial desires and inclinations to grow and ripen, for it is conducted in the context of hearing the Word of God and suitable prayer.

Christian neighbors and friends; influence of the priests and religious; a Church visit, program, event or art; the witness of a lively, committed parish, and so on. (Parishes, to fulfill their mission of evangelization, need to recognize where this is already being accomplished and cooperate with and strengthen these efforts.)

Once the initial conversion has occurred as the result of evangelization, it must be protected and nourished so that it can mature into a true desire for Baptism and life in the Church (No. 10).

This is done in the formal part of the Pre-Catechumenate, in the context of a hospitable community and prayer. (No. 11-12).

For the parish community should open its doors to the inquirers who come seeking the help they need to cooperate with God's grace. This is done in an atmosphere where these persons can feel comfortable and supported.

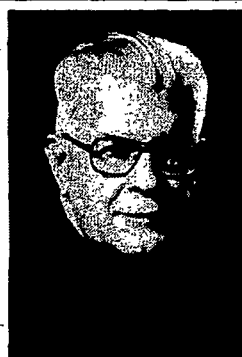
Entering The Mystery

Anyone who follows the comic strip "Peanuts" is, by now, familiar with Snoopy perched on the roof of his doghouse and hard at work at his typewriter. He is writing his great book and he always begins, "It was a dark and stormy night..."

This image serves us well as we begin a four-part series on the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). The process of Christian initiation "takes place step by step in the midst of the community of the faithful (No. 4). The first step is often the "dark and stormy night" of the search for meaning and value in one's life, for belonging to a hospitable and committed community, or for a deeper knowledge of God and Christ. This search is the Holy Spirit's first opening of the hearts of these inquirers, a kind of invitation to focus their meandering search on God, on Christ, on the Church.

The first step or stage of the initiation process is described by the RCIA as the period of Evangelization and Pre-Catechumenate. These 50-cent words mean nothing more — and nothing less! — than the proclamation of the good news of Jesus Christ in such a way that these searchers or inquirers are drawn toward the mystery of God's love and are freely converted to believe in its power (No. 9-10).

There has been a lot of discussion about evangelization in recent years, with much fretting about how the Church will evangelize all those who need to hear the good news and what programs can accomplish this task. Yet evangelization happens all the time, every day. Inquirers hear the good news of Christ in many ways: contact with good
