Juli Loesch:

Peace and Pro-life Groups Must Merge

It was the default of the left that caused the divorce between forces seeking nuclear disarmament and forces promoting the sanctity of unborn life. Juli Loesch told a gathering at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality last week.

Ms. Loesch is founder and chief of Prolifers for Survival, a unique group dedicated to banning both the bomb and abortion.

In town to promote her group, Ms. Loesch also spoke earlier in the day to "nearly the entire student body at DeSales High School" in Geneva.

Ms. Loesch acknowledged that the connection between preserving unborn life and preserving life from the horrors of war has come only in the past few years to her, principally because of learning information on the effects of nuclear radiation on the unborn child.

Since that realization, in 1977, she said, she has ad-

vocated, ban the bomb, not the baby.

The 30-year-old pacifist (she was one of the founders of Philadelphia's Pax Center), is also encouraging a Tax for Life Campaign, the withholding of a token amount from one's telephone tax, to protest both rebuilding nuclear arsenals and abortion.

Prolifers for Survival, she insists, is "not political in the partisan sense," in that it doesn't endorse candidates or legislation, and leaves to

individual consciences the question of a human life amendment or an arms limitation treaty.

Rather, "We're after hearts and minds. We're working on our own conversion, and the conversion of the peace and life movements in cooperation with each other."

Prolifers for Survival counts about 1,000 members nationally, she said.

"We literally go from one Marxist to one Moral Majority member," she said.

"Unless the peace movement and the pro-life movement work together," she said, "both will fail."

Though she sees the "pro-life movement at its peak," she said "it cannot succeed as a right-wing thing; and the peace movement has to increase ten thousand fold and has to be tied with a pro-life consciousness."

"And it ain't too late, folks," she said.

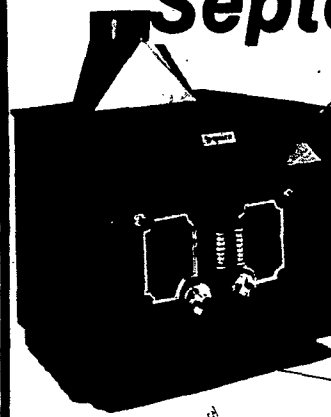

"The council has a goal of 700 new Boy Scout recruits through the 'Home Visit' program," Buckingham said.

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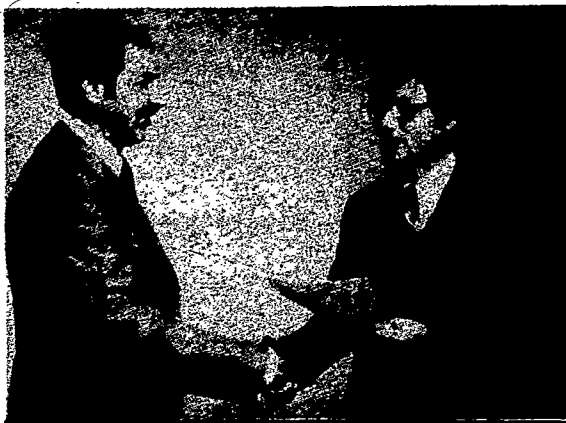
