

Diocesan Pastoral Council:

Parish Spiritual Life Seen as Top Priority

Parish spiritual renewal and an emphasis on drawing young married couples into the life of the parish will be a focus for future diocesan planning, a report given to the Diocesan Pastoral Council last week said.

The report, prepared by the council's Needs Assessment Committee under the chairmanship of Sister Mary Wintish, also asserted, "While progress is being made to enable families to share and pass on the gift of faith, this is a very important priority (of the diocese) and should continue to be emphasized."

In addition, "Little progress has been made to reach the 15-25 year age bracket and this needs much more emphasis."

The report, which will be

condensed for DPC action in November, is a summary of information gained in a survey of parishes earlier this year.

Sister Mary said that a questionnaire was sent to leaders in all parishes and that the 42.6 percent return was considered a good one.

The questionnaire, she said, asked how the leaders perceived the diocese was performing in several areas previously defined as priorities.

The data also revealed that "little progress has been made toward nurturing religious vocations and this priority also requires more emphasis," in the view of parish leaders.

Finally, the report said, "Not enough progress has been made in reaching out to the inactive Catholic and

those who have no religious affiliation and this also requires more emphasis."

Last week's council meeting was an unusual one in that it spanned two days and that the material presented was largely one of reporting rather than items to be acted upon.

The meeting, formally entitled a convocation, also saw the installation of new council members and the installation of regional coordinators and their assistants.

The DPC has as priority the encouragement of regionalism

in the diocese, and this summer asked Bishop Matthew H. Clark to advise the priest regional coordinators to appoint a religious or a lay assistant coordinator.

Reports on the council agenda included presentations by Sister Mary Wintish on the Office of Urban Ministry, by John Brophy on the Ministerial Review Committee, by Father Peter Bayer on diocesan demographics, by Sisters Edwardine Weaver and Mary Ann Binsack on the Division of Education, Father Gerald Appelby on the Division of Special Ministries, Father Charles Mulligan and Maurice Tierney on the Division of Social Ministries.

Father William Flynn on the Division of Support Ministries.

In addition, the council saw a multi-media presentation on the Southern Tier prepared by Ray Defendorf and heard a report from Sister Ann Habershaw on the national bishops' Parish Project Program which is being introduced into the diocese.

Other reports included one on the progress of the bishop's forthcoming pastoral letter on the role of women in the Church, an accounting by the council's Evangelization Task Force, and an update on the proposed diocesan board of education.
