New Awards Program Announced

Nazareth College has established a new merit scholarship program to aid students who have demonstrated outstanding academic achievement. The announcement was made by Paul Buntich, admissions director. Thirty students will be chosen annually to participate in the Nazareth

Scholarship Program. Recipients will be eligible to receive up to \$2,000 per year regardless of financial need. Nazareth scholarships of \$1,500 per year will be awarded and the college also will match the \$250 New York State Regents Scholarships. Minimum requirements for

the program include: a three-year cumulative high school average of 90 or better; a ranking in the top 10 percent of the graduating class; a score of 1200 or better on the Scholastic Aptitude Test or a composite 26 on the American College Test. The scholarship awards are renewable for eight semesters.
