"I like to come to school to see friends, meet people, and for the education. It can be fun in school, and for those who don't like school, my advice is to get involved in activities and made new friends."



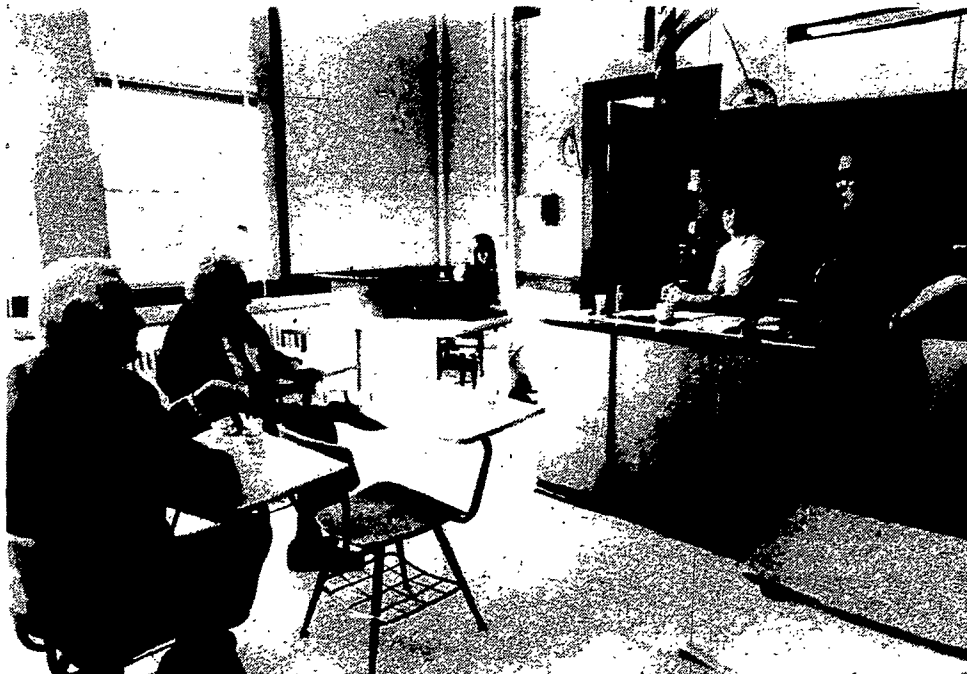
