Knights of Columbus Disagrees with Bishop on Berrigan

Raleigh, N.C. (RNS) — Protests by Catholics, including the Knights of Columbus, failed to halt scheduled talks by Father Daniel J. Berrigan, SJ, the peace activist, or to dissuade Raleigh Catholic Bishop Joseph Gossman from introducing him at one meeting.

The Jesuit priest, who was convicted last summer with seven others of destroying the nose cones of two nuclear missiles at a General Electric plant in Pennsylvania, spoke at four North Carolina colleges.

The talk at North Carolina State University, co-sponsored by the diocesan Ministry of Peace and Justice and the university's Cooperative Campus Ministry, drew the smallest crowd, about 300.

Introducing Father Berrigan at North Carolina State, Bishop Gossman said that "the issue is not Daniel Berrigan but the survival of the human race."

The Raleigh chapter of the Knights of Columbus had taken a full-page advertisement in a local newspaper urging Catholics to boycott the talk.

In response, Bishop Gossman sent a letter to be read at all Masses in the diocese. He explained that he did not endorse all of Father Berrigan's methods but nevertheless had become "increasingly dismayed by our apparent inability to limit

the production and reduce the stockpile of nuclear weaponry."

The president of the Raleigh chapter of the Catholic men's organization said, "We are against him coming to Raleigh. Why should we support this guy who has been in jail for what he has done in the past. It runs against the grain."
