Catholic Family Center has issued an urgent call for 14 families willing to open their homes as foster parents for young Vietnamese or Laotian refugees

"These young people," mostly boys, are coming to the United States to start a new life by themselves. They have been encouraged by their own families to flee from the difficulties_of_their homeland. This is a very dangerous undertaking, and they often are risking their own lives for freedom. It may often cost a Vietnamese or Laotian family \$300 or \$400 in order to

escape. This is a tremendous burden for them and their families," Mrs. Joyce Daley, CFC staffer, said last week.

The center has placed 33 Vietnamese and Laotians between 13 and 18 in foster homes. The CFC anticipates placing a total of 50 youngsters in the next few months.

The center, through the Monroe County Department of Social Services, provides board, medical aid and clothing for the refugees. They are eligible to receive such support until they turn

21 or until they graduate from high school and become employed
