### Liberal Arts Grads Seen Superior for Business World

It is to the advantage of large corporations to choose their executives from the ranks of liberal arts college graduates rather than from among those who have narrowly specialized in their studies, the president of John Carroll University asserted here recently.

Father T.P. O'Malley, SJ, said that his "pronouncedly Catholic" school in Cleveland, Ohio, stresses a broadly based education, which he also said enables graduates to make the career changes which today's executive world demands.

The Jesuit was interviewed in Rochester while on an upstate visit to alumni organizations.

He had earlier written that "the overwhelming trend in higher education, is directed

away from the college student's formation as a 'whole' man or woman, and is directed, by means of increasingly early and narrow specialization, towards obtaining immediately lofty employment, or obtaining admission to graduate school which in turn will lead to lofty employment."

Increasingly, however, the priest said he finds that the truly successful individuals are those whose educational backgrounds are broader and whose abilities are tested by a greater variety of disciplines than specialized education affords.

John Carroll University, founded in 1886, is this year educating more than 6,600 students in both graduate and undergraduate programs.
