

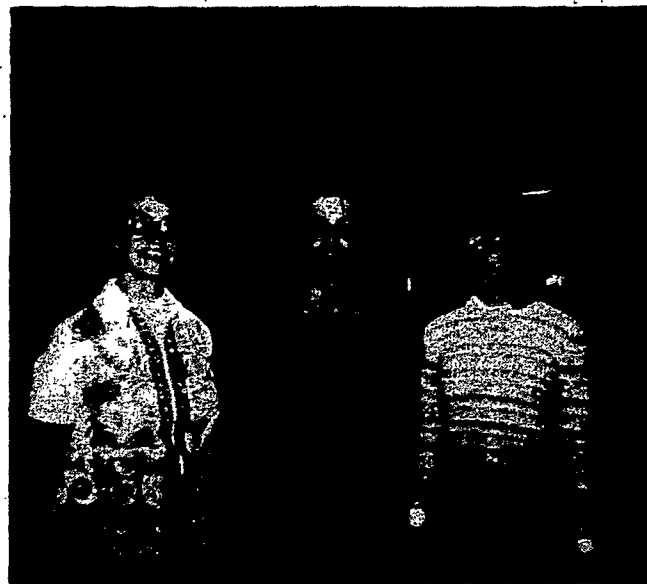

The recent assassination of President Anwar Sadat was a violent end to a life devoted to peace. His bravery and self-assurance gave him the power to try and promote peace in a region of the world that has always been unstable. He was a man who dared to stand for peace and humanity.

Anwar Sadat was a peasant who believed that he was Egypt. His faith in the people of his country was overwhelming and it was inconceivable to many that he was assassinated.
