Food Stamp Program Changes

Food stamp recipients in New York State will be the first to feel the impact of changes in welfare programs mandated by the 1981 Omnibus Reconciliation Act approved by Congress this vear.

According to W. Burton Richardson, director of Monroe County Social Services, food stamp recipients with earned income will begin to see a slight reduction in their food stamp benefits as a result of the way benefits are computed.

Currently, the first 20 percent of earned income is disregarded in computing eligibility. The percentage dropped to 18 percent on Nov. 1. Although the reduction will be small, \$2 to

Of Waiting Waiting is a word always associated with Advent. If we listened carefully this rather, this waiting is a past Sunday, there it was again, tucked into the middle of the Isaiah reading, freely made to be totally lost perhaps in the imagery of potter and clay but present nevertheless: "No of a once-in-a-lifetime ear has ever heard, no eye ever seen, any God but you effort on our part to allow doing such deeds for those who wait for him." Perhaps we are tired of the "waiting" concept of Advent and look for something newer and more refreshing and not worn out with over use. Yet one of the central figures of the Advent season is a woman who symbolizes for us the deepness of the mystery that waiting implies. Waiting in the sense that Isaiah speaks of it on the First Sunday of Advent and as personified in the person of Mary is far from the waiting associated with late buses, routine doctor's appointments and lines at a supermarket checkout stand. This waiting means little or nothing, for we preoccupy ourselves with other things: the morning paper, old magazines, or thoughts of tomorrow or yesterday or whatever comes to mind. The waiting of Isaiah and the waiting of Mary is a dynamic-availability to God - - until he comes.-

Current food stamp cases will be calculated using the new formula when the household is recertified. Households applying for the first time will have their eligibility determined under the new rules, Richardson explained.

Also, beginning this month, Richardson said, strikers will no longer be eligible for food stamps, unless they were eligible before participating in a strike. Strikers who fall into this category will not see their food stamp benefits increase even though their income is reduced during a strike. The change will have no impact currently in Monroe County, he said.
