caused some distress among Roman Catholics nationally. The book tells what Rivera claims are his true-life experiences as a Jesuit priest in Spain: beginning with his studies for the priesthood, then training in espionage and sabotage work, working undercover among unsuspecting Protestant, congregations in Spain and Latin America, his ordination as a priest and soon after a bishop. Along the way, he claims he had an eye-opening experience, was incarcerated by the Church and subjected to torture, and escaped his captors to dedicate his life to winning souls from the Roman Catholic Church.

However, the Catholic League for Religious and Civil Rights disclosed evidence last year that Rivera was never ordained where he claimed, nor was he ever a member of the Society of Jesus.

Prior to his visit here, Rivera- was reported to have said he planned to bring with him documents to show he was indeed a Jesuit priest in the 1960s. But that evidence
