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Faith and Respect Primary Ingredients for Achieving Solid Marriage

Last October, many couples in the diocese who were celebrating their silver or gold anniversaries during the year gathered at a special celebration in Canandaigua. They were asked to give their responses to the following question.

Because we believe in your wisdom, because we believe many married and engaged couples have much to learn from you, would you please share with us your thoughts on this question: How has your marriage helped to discover the meaning of faith?

A few of the reflections follow:

"Marriage is like a beautiful garden in which 'weeds' of one form or another keep popping up and need to be dealt with (problems, conflicts, hardships). We have found that only through prayer and trust in the Lord have we been able to have the strength and continual endurance, of loving enough, to work at removing the weeds that might otherwise overrun and destroy our beautiful garden."

"Our marriage has deepened our mutual love, respect and faith and acceptance of those things God has intended for us. Similarly, faith in God is premised upon love, belief and acceptance. As our marriage grows, so does our faith in God."

"After 50 years of marriage we attribute our happiness and success to cooperation, patience and respect for one another. From the very beginning our marriage was tested during the depression of the 30s and was tempered during the flood of June 1972. We survived the crises because we had faith in God, faith in the teachings of our Cathibic Church, and faith in each other."

The Proper Way **To Receive Guests**

The receiving line is an excellent way for both families to meet and it is a warm, friendly way to start the reception off.


what binds all together."

It is helpful to set up a small refreshment table near the end of the line to encourage mingling.


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
