Films for Disabled Donated by Kodak

A series of eight coded-captioned films for handicapped students has been donated by Eastman Kodak Company to BOCES I, the National Technical Institute for the Deaf, and the Rochester School for the Deaf.

The films are a development of Hearst Metrotone News, a division of the Hearst Corporation. This Screen News Digest (SND) educational film series is produced in association with the Instructional Design Production F Group.

SND coded-captioned films have been designed as a learning resource for students with special needs and to enable teachers to educate students with various learning styles in the same class.

We are pleased to make this new instructional resource available to schools

as a communications aid for students with learning and hearing impairments," said Dorothy A. Luebke, Kodak's director of community relations.

The initial set of eight films covers many different subjects including science, energy, government, business and economics.

Although the practice of captioning films is more than 50 years old, previous attempts have produced edited or interpreted information for the hearing impaired. With the new SND films, however, the entire narration is imprinted on the film, thereby presenting the handicapped students with the same information as students who can hear.
