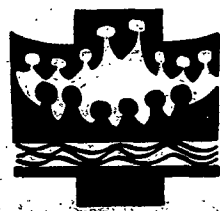
Ever wonder why...

Liturgical Functions Of Deacons

stages of Christian initiation through which he guides the catechumens.

Reflections on the styles of liturgical functions which, in his own right, the deacon exercises within the worshiping assembly leads to the theological understanding of diaconate as a public ministry of leadership and service in the works of charity and justice, grounded within the hierarchical structure of the Church through the Sacrament of Holy Orders.

Thus the deacon is charged in the course of the rite of ordination with many sacramental and liturgical ministries. As a minister of the altar he proclaims the Gospel, prepares the sacrifice, and gives the Body and Blood of the Lord to the community of believers.

The deacon is charged, too, with the ministry of evangelization and preaching, bringing God's word to believers and unbelievers alike, and opening up the Scriptures to all who have ears to hear.

The deacon presides in the name of the bishop or pastor over the public prayer of the Church, most fittingly in the Liturgy of the Hours which he himself is encouraged to pray in the name of the whole Church.

The deacon is charged as well with ministering the Sacrament of Baptism to those to whom he has preached the gospel. As ordinary minister of baptism, he may preside at the rites which mark the various

The deacon may officiate at marriages in the Church, and may bestow the nuptial blessing on the newly married couple. He appropriately exercises the ministry for those whom he has assisted in their spiritual preparation for the Sacrament of Matrimony.

The deacon may be asked to conduct the funeral and burial services, performing the last offices of piety for those to whom he ministered in their life, and bringing the consolation of hope to those who mourn.

The proper liturgical vesture of the deacon is the alb and stole. The stole is worn on his left shoulder and is joined at his right side. On solemn occasions he wears the dalmatic. When appropriate, he wears the cope.

In the performance of his liturgical functions, the deacon (like the bishop and priest) must faithfully observe the canonical discipline currently in force in their regard. Most importantly, he must exercise his ministries in the spirit of prayer and service, through which he helps to build up the Body of Christ, and strengthens those to whom he ministers to live their own vocation to service in the community of the Church.

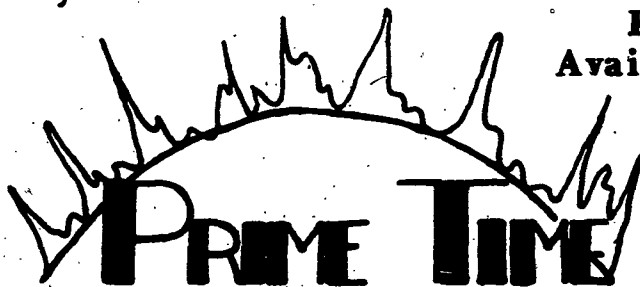
In order to register, pre-school children must be three
