# **Closing of St. Agnes High Draws Parental Protests**

Last week, 370 St. Agnes students, their parents and teachers were told by Sister Anne Guerin, principal, the school would close in June. Within 24 hours of the annoucement a parents meeting was called and 140 of them met at 6 p.m., on Sunday, Feb. 28, at St. Helen's school on Hinchey Road.

They want satisfaction and answers to why they were not forewarned about the closing, said Mrs. Jean Dettman, a St. Agnes alumna and organizer of the meeting. Another question that needed answering, she said, was whether the building has been sold. According to a statement made last Friday by Sister committees — a methods Jasmine Riley, superior committee that will be general of the Sisters of St.

Joseph of Rochester who run St. Agnes and Nazareth Academy, there has been no decision regarding the disposition of the building and adjacent convent.

The building's status has a bearing on what direction the parents' actions take in trying to save the school. Before the end of the meeting, said Mrs. Dettman, the theme was "save the school." Six committees were formed during the meeting and the first one, communcations, went operable immediately. Members will be contacting Sister Jamesine Riley, the **Board of Trustees and Bishop** Matthew H. Clark during this week. If the building has not changed hands, the other

publicity, committee, an alumni committee, a futures committee that will contact the incoming freshem class, and a recruitment committee that will reach out to the Catholic community - will go into action.

'We hope it isn't too late," said Mrs. Dettman. "We don't want to lose the school." She said that another parents meeting has been scheduled for 6 p.m., this Sunday, March 7, at St. Helen's.

According to a news release issued by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Rochester, the reasons for closing the school were declining enrollment and the increasing deficit in the yearly operating budget. The high school hit a peak enrollment of 800 in 1973 and is now operating with its

A number of possibilities for keeping the school open were explored by the Board of Trustees, a lay advisory group and Sister Anne Guerin, principal, but they were not considered feasible. One such possibility, raising the \$900 yearly tuition, was discarded because it was thought that this move would put an education at St. Agnes High School beyond the reach of the majority of families whom the school has traditionally served.

In a letter to St. Agnes parents, Sister Jamesine Riley said, "If in justice we could have made any other decision, we would have."

Bishop Matthew Clark said that he knew well the difficulty of such decisions and the personal struggle of those who are faced with them, and added, "I am hopeful that many of the students of St. Agnes will be able to continue their education in another Catholic secondary school."
