## Vatican U.N. Aide Held in Smuggling

New York (RNS) - Four men, including a Catholic priest attached to the Vatican staff of the United Nations, have been charged with smuggling stolen art treasures into the United States.

Father Lorenzo Zorza, 41, was arrested by U.S. Customs officials at the rectory of St. Agnes Church were he lived and did part-time pastoral work.

According to Sister Kathleen McCusker, director of communications for the Sisters of St. Joseph, the Sisters would help evaluate all plans explored by the parents group.


