## **Biblical Reading Is Questioned**

Dear Father Hohman:

As a Catholic woman I have become increasingly uncomfortable with some of the readings which appear as part of the celebration of the Mass. Last Sunday's reading (Jan. 31), from I Corinthians 7: 25-35, is typical of where my discomfort lies.

We do a disservice to our young people, both boys and girls, when we treat the valuable vocation of marriage and family life as à mere "distraction," reinforced by reference to Biblical authority, i.e., St. Paul.

I truly believe that my vocation as wife and mother to six sons is a blessing which is no less a value than the vocation of a religious or single person and, may I dare say, much more difficult to fulfill. I also believe that in my ministry as a registered nurse I share my concern for the "things of the Lord" as a caretaker of his more dependent children.

I realize that reading from the bible is significant since. it was inspired by God and when Paul wrote his letters anite relevant to the needs of the day but with all due respect I truly feel there are more appropriate readings to be shared during our celebrations at Mass, maybe some of the articles from the recent Vatican Councils. Our liturgical celebrations must be relevant and supportive of Christian ministry in whatever vocation our children may choose in order to perpetuate the continuum of their spiritual lives and their relationship with Our Lord. As Catholic men and women, we need to be reminded of the significance

of our ministry with our Lord's "concerns."

Dear S.P.,

The case you point to is a perfect example of the pitfalls of taking a particular book from scripture and simply using sections of it consecutively over a number of Sundays. However, it is, as you point out, the word of God and therefore has a primary right to be in the celebration of the Liturgy of the Word. No matter what other documents we might find, regardless of their apparent relevance, they fade into insignificance by comparison. The fact that we have to work hard to obtain a relevant meaning for a particular passage should not deter us from using it.

The passage you refer to speaks to the idea of our need for detachment in terms of union with the Lord. \*The author was obviously under the impression that the world was coming to an end shortly and therefore the state of total concentration on the Lord was the best possible state. While that does not apply to our time nor does the seeming disparagement of marriage, nevertheless, it helps us to think in terms of priorities. Celibacy is a living witness to the priority of the Lord in our lives and therefore we should at least consider this from time to time. In other words, this passage can be useful even though we have to work at

ministered within the framework of the school philosophy and mission statement of the Congregation of the Sisters of Mercy.

High. It was felt that the principal was burdened with too many duties. The new concept would help to relieve her of some administrative duties to give her more time to deal with parents, other principals, and alumnae. It also would allow the principal to have help in handling decisions and sharing the burden of responsibility. The whole concept was "in-novative and challenging," said Sister Jean Marie Kearse, Superior General of the Sisters of Mercy.

According to school sources, Sister Bonaventure is pleased with the new approach. She is free to do other things because there is no constant pressure for deadlines. In her opinion everyone ended up with jobs that were workable.

Miss Wisner, new to administration, found the team "very exhilirating and a challenge." She feels a shared effort and responsibility. Sister Mary Alice, who had previously been part of the administration, has sensed a "more open line of communication" and feels the support of her teammates.

After having worked together for one semester the



team has been encouraged by the new approach and Sister Bonaventure stated that "the administration team adds positively to the quality of asset. No one principal can team effort."
