



## **Kodak Purchases** Former Seminary

The diocese and Eastman Kodak Co. have signed a \$2 million agreement for Kodak's purchase of the former St. Bernard's Seminary property on Lake Avenue.

The purchase is contingent upon various approvals for the development of the property for non-manufacturing purposes. The property is unoccupied.

Under the development plan proposed by the diocese and Kodak in consultation with officials of the Landmark Society of Western New York, the exterior of the main building and the land fronting it would be preserved as a historical landmark. The property will be used for research, training and administrative purposes.

The plan for the 22-acre property specifies the total floor area, heights and general locations of buildings that might be constructed in the future; 20 percent of the

property could be occupied by buildings.

Bishop Matthew H. Clark said that the sale would provide much-needed money for programs of formation and education of seminarians and priests from the diocese. and also to underwrite the program at the new St. Bernard's Institute, on the grounds of Colgate Rochester Divinity School.

"At the same time," he said, "we would be disposing of the property in a manner hat recognizes its community's heritage. I am very positive about the agreement. While meeting our desire to help ensure the preservation of the most historically significant portion of the former seminary, we will also be responding to the financial needs of the diocese."

Walter A. Fallon, Kodak chairman, said the purchase the property would

provide the company with a "unique opportunity to expand within the city."

"This is one of the last major parcels of property contiguous with Kodak Park in the city," Fallon said. "It gives us still another opportunity to affirm our confidence in the future of this community. We respect the historic importance of the site and we intend to develop it in a very sensitive

The property is a short distance north of the Kodak Research Laboratories complex, on the east side of Lake Avenue.

A. Vincent Buzard, president of the Landmark Society of Western New York, said the development plan is a model of landmark preservation. "Through the cooperative efforts of all the parties, a modern, adaptive reuse of an immportant


