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## Extra Oomph In Recipes

Some of my best recipes are those given to me by a friend or relative after having been served a delicious meal in their homes. Thus the recipe comes complete with warm memories which I happen to think makes the food even better than it normally would be.

The following recipe for chicken in wine sauce has been in my file for nearly as long as I've been married and has been used over and over again for both company dinners and family suppers.

It is super easy, making it a good dish for your teenager to try his or her hand at and it also appeals to male cooks in that it is a one-dish delight. The following recipe serves four but I have stretched it for six or eight by multiplying both the chicken parts and the sauce.

**CHICKEN IN WINE SAUCE**

Mix together the following ingredients to use as marinade: 1/4 cup of rose wine (I also use chablis), 1/4 cup soy sauce, 1/4 cup salad oil, 2 tbsp. water, 1/2 tsp.

garlic powder, 1 tsp. ginger, 1/4 tsp. oregano, and 1 tsp. brown sugar.

Pour marinade over two chicken breasts (split) and four legs in large ovenproof dish. Refrigerate for three or four hours. If the marinade does not entirely cover the meat, baste often. Bake covered at 350 degrees for 60 to 90 minutes or until tender.

Chicken in wine sauce is delicious served with rice using the cooked marinade as a gravy. Buttered noodles and baked potatoes also work as side dishes.

While we are in the kitchen, I would like to apologize to Elizabeth Scaptura of Watkins Glen. While straightening up the office this week I discovered a letter from her under the big dictionary.

She requested the address of the Mount Morris Historical Society cookbook. Here it is, Elizabeth, two months late: Traditional Italian recipes of Mount Morris, 14 Main St., Mount Morris, N.Y. 14510.
