Viewpoint: Sisters Reflect



The Liberation Of Those **Imprisoned**

I have been involved with Rochester Interfaith Jail Ministry for a year and a half and in many ways the ministry, the men and women I serve and the Board and volunteers with whom I labor, have enfleshed the Gospel for me in many unique and wonderful ways. When the prophet Isaiah reminds us that the Messianic Age will be one in which the broken-hearted will be healed and prisoners will be set free, I have a hard time reconciling that message with the buildings, structures and institutions we have created to deal with and care for victims and the accused. I keep asking myself. "How do we bring liberation to those confined in maximum security? How do we preach the freeing message of the Gospel? How do we reach into the tombs and cages of their lives and speak a message of hope. promise and new life?" Gospel liberation is our business! But how do we do it? Our ministry has taken seriously the words of the author of Hebrews: "Remember those in prison, as if you were their fellow prisoner." (Hebrews 13:3)

There in those words is the key for all of us who are called to care for our brothers and sisters who are incarcerated. When we rccognize our own weaknesses and sins, when we can name the fact that we too are in need of healing and new life, then we can be effective ministers in jails, prisons - indeed, in any institution or community in which we find ourselves.

Often, as I have chaired the Diocesan Sisters Council, I have watched the women who are seated before and around me. What a richness they represent! There are teachers, coun-selors, hospital administrators, spiritual directors, nurses, pastoral care workers, school administrators, rural ministers, college chaplains and on and on. Each woman is literally "graced" with marvelous gifts, drawn by the Lord and the spirit of her respective

congregation to place those gifts at the feet of the community, the Church. And in a wonderful symbol of the Body of Christ, these very same women come together to offer their collective wisdom and experience to enrich the

Diocese of Rochester

through the Sisters Council.

There is great cause for celebration here! Deeply committed. prayerful women are walking with people, are present in institutions and structures which so desperately need their gifts. These mature and holy women are not afraid to ask and face the difficult questions about life, the future and who face their brothers and sisters with an embrace of care and compassion. There is so much hope and so much promise here. This is what we need to celebrate in this diocese! Numbers, memories about Sisters are important but they are not as essential as the attitude of openness to the future and the willingness to face the hard questions and realities about life that lie before all of us as believing men and women.

For me, at this time in my personal history. I am trying to address these questions in a system that needs reform and humanizing. For other Sisters the place will be different but what a gift that they are there and willing to labor in love. It is liberation that we are about! With all of our brothers and sisters the task is to make the Word become flesh again, over and over, in the dailiness of life.

During the past several months, many of our Sisters have shared with you their lives and their ministries through this column. At this time I would like to thank them all and to congratulate the Courier-Journal for continuing the series. I do hope that in the months ahead you will meet many more Sisters, fine women of this diocese, and that through them you will be filled with hope and life, the kind of hope and life that they receive from all of you!

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
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
