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Education — Mission of All the People

There was a time when we believed that the work of education belonged to the "educators." Today the work of public education is shared and in many ways controlled by the structure of school boards. The involvement of a broader representative group for making educational decisions is a response to the call of the Second Vatican Council urging structures to provide for collegial decision making.

Education is not alone in believing in the need for responsible representation in decision making. The goal of parish councils is to be such a group at the parish level. We have seen the growth and development of parish councils in our diocese for more than an decade. Vital to the effectiveness of the work of the councils is the work of its committees.

We recommend that each parish have an active education committee which works with parish leadership and professional educators in setting priorities, programs and policies for the work of that ministry within the parish. Due to the scope of responsibility for these committees, it is often necessary to subdivide into particular areas for effectiveness; e.g., a committee for a Catholic school, religious education, adult education, etc. Communications between and among these groups and to the parish council is essential for the unity and effectiveness of educational ministry within that setting.

The Division of Education is sponsoring workshops for parish councils and committees during September and October in various parts of the diocese. The purpose of these workshops is to provide an opportunity for these groups as well as parish staffs to see their roles and relationships in offering services to their community.

Parallel to encouraging the formation and function of committees for education at the local level, we have studied the feasibility of the formation of a Diocesan Board of Education. The establishment of such a board was recommended by the Diocesan Pastoral Council and approved by Bishop Clark in 1981. Since that time, a committee has been developing a design for the work of the board in our diocese. This board will be composed of a broad representation of people geographically and also with varying educational



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interests. This board will work with the bishop and the Division of Education to study needs, set priorities, recommend programs and policies for the educational ministries within the diocese. Through this progress of research and discussion and collegial decision making we will experience the shared wisdom and shared. responsibility of Church. At the same time the bishop will have the opportunity to present his vision and direction by requesting and initiating programs and policies.

Some may ask: Are all of these committees and boards necessary? Are all of these meetings necessary? In his address to the National Catholic Education Association in April, 1982, Archbishop John Roach answered those questions in these words: "It would be simplier to do all of our decision making internally. To do so, however, would be to lose the richness of the experience of that wide spectrum of people who are serious about sharing the office in which they are enpowered by their baptism and who do have their own role to play in the mission of the whole people of God in the Church and in the world."



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
