Youth Ministry

Youth Ministry is the ongoing attempt to put one's own search for God, with all the moments of pain and joy, despair and hope, at the disposal of those who want to join this search but do not know how.

The Office of Youth Ministry was established this year to facilitate the accomplishment of this task. During the past year, the **Diocesan Youth Commission** planned the approach to and design of this office. In early June, a director was hired and on July 1, the office became a reality.

Presently the office is available for consultation to parishes, schools and institutions of the diocese. Among the services available are planning and program development for parishes, which includes consultation and assistance in developing or expanding programs.

The office is prepared to offer skills training in group dynamics, communication,

skills the teens can use in their own parishes or schools.

Another area that the office will look at is the development of teen spirituality. We can offer help with ideas for developing programs of spiritual growth and planning worship. There is also information and help available to develop programs on prayer and Bible study for teenagers.

The leaders of teen groups are also a focus of the office. Adults working with teens also need support and help. The director is prepared to meet those working with youths to address the issues, concerns or problems. Help in planning, program design and evaluation is available. There will also be the opportunity for those working with youths to gather together for mutual support, to share ideas, and to learn about new ideas and techniques.

The future holds great possibility. There will be a newsletter beginning later this year, and the publishing of a Directory of Youth Ministry to make people aware of services to youth, and possible resources of which they may be unaware.

Diocese Thanked For Contributions To Catholic U.

Washington — The contribution of \$18,560 from the people of the Diocese of Rochester to the pontifical Catholic University of was recently America acknowledged in a letter of gratitude from University Provost John Joseph Murphy.

In his letter to Bishop Matthew H. Clark, Dr. Murphy said, "The need becomes clearer every day for teaching and research which are value-centered and which occur in a context that explicates the fullness of human personhood. We cannot conceive of genuine education in the absence of a constant appreciation of the presence of God in all His works."

Shrinking financial resources, both from private and public sectors, and new making tax legislation donations to private institutions less attractive "make us keenly aware of how important is the support we receive from the annual diocesan collection," Dr. Murphy stated.

The Catholic University was begun by the American bishops in 1887 and has been supported by annual diocesan collections since 1903. Last year's collections totaled nearly \$3.5 million, representing 7.28 percent of the budget for the University in Washington, D.C.
