The jawboning that goes on is enough to drive me crazy. And the dog — not understanding that yells and taunts of "You're lazy ... That's my shirt you've got on ... Don't you dare eat the last ice cream bar ... and ... If you look at me one more time like that I'll punchya ..." are expressions of love — goes into a wild fit of barking.

There was a time when they were younger that I tried to arbitrate. I also tried running away from home once but the car would only go as far as the plaza, afraid no doubt, that they would physically harm each other.

In recent years I head for the laundry knowing that no self-respecting kid would follow me there. The washer and dryer are on their last legs now and I've got the cleanest, most thread-bare towels in town. Please, Lord, let those progressive school officials see the error of their ways.
