All in the Family

Columnist Gets Saucy

Every time I hear the phrase "authentic Italian meal" I think of my brother-in-law Ted who was invited home by a college friend for just such a repast.

When they sat down to dinner, a bowl of cooked, unadorned spaghetti was plunked down in the center of the table. When the bowl was passed to him he politely helped himself to a portion, then watched in horror as the catsup bottle began making its way around the table, each of the family members liberally dousing their pasta with the stuff.

I felt a little like he must have when I came across a column by the New York Times food writer Pierre Franey (a sidekick of Craig Claiborne) in which he advised readers that they can make an excellent spaghetti sauce with ground beef.

In my experience, ground beef, hamburger, ground round — call it what you will — may be the least desirable meat on which to simmer a sauce. The reason? Beef doesn't have all that much flavor to start with and when it is ground, it seems to lose what it has.

What is the best? In my opinion both pork and chicken produce naturally flavorful sauces.

For our family of five I use four mild Italian sausages. Because of the seasonings added by the sausage maker you don't

have to add anything but the tomatoes. In recent months I have been using Redpack Crushed Tomatoes (not the whole tomatoes packed in puree nor the puree itself) and have had excellent results.

SARAH'S SPAGHETTI SAUCE

Brown four mild Italian sausages. Prick with fork and discard fat. Then add two large cans of Redpack Crushed Tomatoes. Simmer for a couple of hours. Don't add paste or anything else. You should get raves.

When I use chicken as a sauce base, I remove the skin first to lessen the amount of fat. Use a lower heat to brown chicken parts.

Because we are making a conscious effort to reduce the amount of meat in our meals (for both health and economic reasons), I reserve the sausage or chicken and use them in dishes for other meals. A small amount of grated cheese — Parmesan, Romano, locatelli or pecorino — will, with what is already available in the pasta, provide all the protein your family needs.

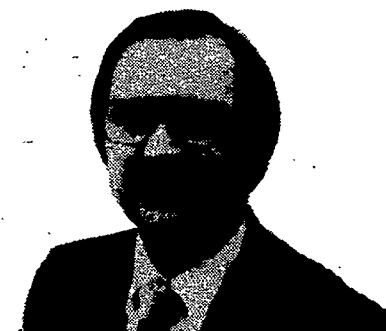

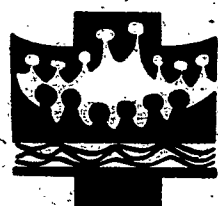

Insights In Liturgy



Introducing... The Office Of Liturgy

During the past few months, changes have been taking place at the Liturgy Office. While these changes do not directly affect the celebration of liturgy (the purpose of this column), they do affect the style and direction of the diocesan office. This direction will, hopefully, allow all liturgical ministers in the diocese to continue to grow in their awareness of their sacred ministry. For this reason, this week, we detour a little from our normal course to talk about ourselves.

In July, a new director came into the office. Father Thomas P. Mull was assigned as director of the Office of Liturgy and as the associate pastor of Sacred Heart Cathedral. As director, he is responsible for the administration of the Office of Liturgy, serves as executive secretary of the Diocesan Liturgical Commission, is a resource person for various liturgical activities, is responsible to the bishop for diocesan celebrations of liturgy, and serves as liaison between the office and the Diocesan Division of Special Ministry. As associate pastor, he will now be able to serve for close communication between the Cathedral and the office. Helpful, as well, is the ongoing experience of working with an established liturgy committee in that parish. This gives good, realistic contact for some of the "problems" or "questions" which may arise in the areas of general parish worship.

Father Mull joined an office which, for one year, was operated by Sister Nancy Burkin, SSJ, associate director, and Pamela Schaeffer, resource assistant. In her position as associate director, Sister Nancy gets out to parishes in the role of teacher, facilitator and evaluator. She is responsible for lector education, Eucharistic minister education, usher/greeter training, and Liturgy Committee consultation and training, as well as being available for individual workshops and training sessions.

Mrs. Schaeffer, as resource assistant, provides invaluable assistance in the areas of education and communication. She is responsible for the preparation of articles for this weekly column and monthly office publication, "Living Liturgy," and she

also answers innumerable questions over the telephone and by mail. She serves as a consultant on copyright law and its use for diocesan and parish celebrations, organizes the office's program schedule and workshop registration details, and provides the office with very necessary clerical assistance.

As of Sept. 1, a new member was added to our office. John Kubiniec joined us as consultant for Liturgical Music. In this capacity, Kubiniec will serve as resource person to diocesan pastoral musicians (singing groups and their directors, organists, guitarists, instrumentalists, cantors, and leaders of song). He will work with the Diocesan Music Committee and act as liaison with that hard-working group and the office. He will join the office staff in its general liturgical work, and be available to assist parishes in their liturgical/musical growth.

Why have an office of this size and expertise? The answer to this question is quite simple: to be of service to the people of the diocese!

Over and over again, liturgical concerns are being voiced by people "getting involved" in the liturgical life of their parish, and the various consultative bodies of the diocese (DPC, Priests Council, Sisters Council) have requested help and guidance for parishes and regions. Together with the pastoral teams of parishes, the Liturgy Office staff will be available to give guidance and allow more people to draw from our resources.

Diocesan celebrations are also important. The office becomes directly involved in these celebrations and draws others into the experience. With the varied people of the office involved, the diocese can look forward to continued beautiful and expressive liturgical celebrations with their bishop.

Finally, with the direction of our bishop and the various consultative bodies, the generous support of the people through the Bishop's Annual Thanks Giving Appeal, and the continued growth of diocesan in general, we all look forward to a new awareness of liturgy as it grows into the fiber of our lives. Through a mutual learning and growing experience, the diocese can become more aware of the richness of our Catholic heritage in liturgy and better use that knowledge to help others to worship God.
