Father Edward Steinkirchner, pastor of St. Michael's Church, Newark, stands in front of the new chapel constructed in the basement of the church in an effort to conserve energy and cut heating costs. Father Steinkirchner invited Rochester artist Carl Zollo to draw plans and design furnishings for the chapel. Zollo crafted the sanctuary lamp and holy water font in steel, and reworked statues of the Virgin Mary and St. Joseph, which were formerly in the convent chapel. The altar, tabernacle (left) and lectern were made of oak by parishioner James Klahn. Benches were built by Anthony DeMarco, Batik window coverings were made by Sister Kristin Malone, SSJ, and the candlesticks on the altar were carved by Dr. James Palmeri. The chapel, which seats 50 and is used for daily Mass, also features accessibility for the handicapped. Donations from parishioners helped pay for the addition which was inaugurated on Aug. 17.

A Great Beginning for New Fund Drive



Former St. Agnes Director Continues in Dramatics

Sister Ann Patrice Carrigan, SSJ, former chairman of the St. Agnes High School Fine Arts Department, is now coordinator of the theater program at the Rochester Association of Performing Arts (RAPA). One of her priorities at the Webster-based arts school will be to write a sequential theater curriculum that RAPA will offer to preschoolers and adults.

She and five other members of the department will develop new course options for the school and bring in both area and outside artists for performances at RAPA.

"Since RAPA is a school provisionally chartered by the Board of Regents, I want to be

able to present our program in its entirety to parents, educators and theater personnel," Sister Ann explained, and added, "RAPA's focus in the arts can be a real supplement to public and parochial schools."

Other commitments on Sister Ann's agenda this year will be the directing of the Cardinal Mooney Follies poster," and the Jewish Community Center for a "Reader's Theatre" presentation.

Sister Ann Patrice has 18 years experience in directing and teaching at the junior and senior high levels. She has a MA in English from the Bread Loaf School of English and has done graduate work in

theater at Bread Loaf, Bridgeport, and Ithaca colleges.
