• Surrogate's Court, while not receiving the publicity received by both County Court and Supreme Court, is nevertheless of vital importance to the entire community. For in dealing with the affairs of decedents, that is people who die within the confines of Monroe County and whose affairs need to be settled in an orderly fashion, it indeed touches everyone sooner or later.

It is the Surrogate's Court that handles the probate and acceptance of the Will document that sets up the executorship and establishes the distribution of the decedent's property. In the case of no Will, Surrogate Court oversees the work of the duly appointed "Administrator" of an estate. Obviously it deals in a very emotional and sensitive area at a time when grief and sorrow are present. Surrogate Court has jurisdiction also in the areas of adoption and guardianship.

An important committment was recently made by candidate Ciaccio to the former Surrogate, Michael A. Telesca in con**66** In the office of Surrogate Court, there is no room for politics.

Therefore, a Surrogate judge must be respected by other attorneys especially for impartiality and integrity. Broad interests in life, knowledge of law, and the sensitivity to handle the aggrieved and the lonely are other necessary attributes.

Arnold F. Ciaccie (D-I) seems to be such a candidate. He has twice worn the bar's "superior" rating. He has tried civil cases in Surrogate and Supreme courts since 1954. He's been counsel to the speaker of the state Assembly, the Metropolitan Transif Authority, the Farmers Home Administration, Community Savings Bank and Irondequoit. He's brought up six children and has been active in community and political life.

A vote for Claccio would be a vote for a superb candidate, not just a vote against Lawrence I. Goldstein (R-C), who has been disowned by both parties and found "unqualified" by the bar.


and be a person of broad gauge and good character. Claccio, rated "superior" by the Bar, has the credentials that are needed.
