Checking The Second Draft

Some personal reflections on the second draft of the bishops' statement, "The Challenge of Peace":

1. It is a good, serious effort to deal responsibly with an extremely difficult moral problem. It is worth a careful reading, but its length and style will result in its being known mostly through quotations and reports.

2. I know of no other effort anywhere in Catholic thought to deal as seriously and as broadly with the theological significance of modern warfare, modern weapons.

Considering the seriousness of the dangers, such thinking is an urgent need. The effort deserves respect. It should not be subjected to cheap shots about the incompetence of the bishops to say anything significant regarding weaponry and national policy.

If other groups choose to do comparable work to develop their own judgments fine But at least the bishops should be credited for a section effort to develop some public evaluation of life and death issues.

3. There are clear moral judgments in the second draft which contradict our present mational policy. Most promutently the draft judges as second our present threat of using nuclear weapons is response to any overt aggression against western Europe.

4 While the statement equally interested in movi certainly raises problems of back from the danger conscience for Catholics in nuclear disaster, from the armed services and for immense expenditur those involved in building involved in such weapons.

nuclear weapons, I do not see that it demands any specific new response out of religious obedience.

The statement calls for serious, conscientious thought about these issues. It's not likely to result in the massive departure of Catholics from military service or from defense industries.

5. For me, the most important, practical implication of the statement has to do with my response as a citizen of this nation.

Neither the bishops nor the individual citizens can formulate the specific steps by which diplomatic and defense goals can be attained.

After a careful reading of the statement, these are some of my firm convictions:
