# A Life **Of Rigid** Discipline

In October I escorted a group from the diocese to Japan. Hong Kong and China. Our China visit was only six days in Peking and Shanghi — just enough to whet the appetite for more knowledge and friendship with Chinese people; and to bring a sadness at the dire grip the Communist system has over the lives of a billion people.

The party leaders control the lives of the people in a kind of national slavery. It assigns jobs. locates and dislocates people at will, sends people to far off communes and Chinese gulags. It can and often does select marriage mates.

This past year the party brought out an order for population control, permitting one child to a family. A second baby brings economic and social penalties against the parents. Since male babies are desired over females, many female babies are being put to death at birth, or left out to die of exposure. In a couple of decades there will not be enough women for the men to marry causing a further problem.

just. governable nation within the framework of the Chinese Republic.

The Communists took over with rigid discipline, with a concern for the millions of utterly disenfranchised peasants, a rigid puritanical ethic regarding sex, dope, prostitution; and a hatred for capitalism and capitalists, for land lords and upper classes, which flowed over to a hatred for the educated, professionals, teachers, religious leaders. It brought some good things. and some terrible things, through a system which is practical slavery.

Of religion in China, Fox Butterfield writes, "During the Cultural Revolution in 1966, all of (Anglican) Bishop Xie's vestments and religious books were burned by Red Guards, and he had been sent to work first in a factory and then in a village. His superior, the former bishop of Fuzhou. had been tortured to death. But Bishop Xie recounted the Christian faith had survived by going underground. A number of people held services secretly. Their Bibles and hymnals had been destroyed, but they still preached to their relatives and friends. "If religion has provided for long-pent-up feelings among China's Christians, Buddhists and Taoists. it is even more volatile an issue for the ethnic minorities who inhabit the vast western and northern parts of the country. Sitting in Peking. one can easily forget that there are 55 identifiable separate minorities in China. They occupy over half of China's land area and their significance is magnified because they live along the critical frontiers with the Soviet Union. Mongolia. Afghanistan. Pakistan. India, Burma and Vietnam." (p. 229)



PAINTING: INTERIOR, EXTERIOR



While our Chinese experience was short, the interest aroused impelled me to read several books on China. The best is "China: Alive in a Bitter Sea" by Pulitzer Prize-winning Fox Butterfield, who was the first New York Times correspondent allowed to live in China since Mao's 1949 revolution. He lived and traveled in China from 1979 through 1981. He writes with affection for the Chinese people, and a keen appraisal of the Communist system. He came with a prejudice in favor of the Communist government. He left with a strong judgment against it.

When the Communists took over from the Nationalist government which retreated to Taiwan. they succeeded a govern-ment riddled with ment riddled corruption. factionalism. greed, and little regard for the millions of peasants and a core of idealist Chinese who were working to make a

In 1958. Sinoligist Professor John Fairbank gave a lecture at Harvard University which was the seed to produce "China: Alive in a Bitter Sea." He said. "China has 800 million people, an ancient history -and therefore should be taken seriously." Twentythree years later China has a billion people, and should be taken seriously. One out of every four human beings today is Chinese.
