### **Peace Lies** In Truth

For several years I have carried with me from place to place my own sort of totem bag of a few precious things — Schiller's "Ode To Joy," the Gregorian "Salve Regina," and Chaucer's poem, "Truth." Of late 1 have been drawn to reflection on the Chaucer poem. Peace, I have concluded, lies in truth, and the words of this poet's "Ballad of Good Counsel" hold significance for us today. What follows is my free translation of Chaucer's 14th century words:

Turn away from the fray, the plays for power: Live with God and seek integrity. Though you have little, let it be enough.

Ambition mothers envy and sours your society; Desire nothing more than what you need.

Rule yourself, take care of all your faults Before you go reforming all the world.

There's no mistake — with Truth to be your guide We shall soon be delivered into peace.

Do not storm and fret about your work This world — a mote. a mite, is all. And peace Comes of its own accord with quietness. Beware of tripping up on your own plans, Of banging futile head

against a wall. Tame yourself if you would be for good.

If you would make a difference in this world. There's no mistake — with Truth to be your guide We soon shall be delivered into peace.

Leave off then with long faced misery. That is for the slaves. the thralls of pride. There's mercy plenty from our God for us

Who made us, nothings

To take a simple pleasure in our lives. Let be that Power with you, and pray

It stay with you, with me. with everyone: There's no mistake - with

Truth to be your guide We soon shall be delivered into peace. If we are to accomplish

anything with our work, it is the contemplative, Godcentered humility underlying Chaucer's words that can keep us going. We know that God has already done it all with the "great kiss for all the millions of the world" that Schiller experienced in his poem. However, we must still do our work. Like the pregnant virgin whose compassionate glance we pray for in the "Salve Regina," we must accept the Truth as we receive it and then go about accomplishing whatever lies within our scope, listening all the time to the Spirit as we hear it.

It is amazing how people do persist in working. writing, dreaming of peace. There is no reward here for such activities. Who else but our God could-push such a concept, and, with no apparent validation for it, get such responses for so long? Who else could draw people. century after century. through such varied works and expressions to stake and gladly lose if need be their lives, all for the sake of this possibility?
