Sundry Answers

At a recent Day of Renewal at Ithaca, a question period surfaced problems hidden in people's consciousness. Here are a few.

How do you know you are doing the will of God?

I suppose if you are honestly doing what you believe you ought to be doing, you can rest easy that you are doing God's will. When our Lord said: "Be ye perfect as our heavenly Father is perfect." He did not expect us to have the infinite perfection of God, but the perfection peculiar to our own priesthood and talents and state and grace.

Why don't they leave things alone in the church?

Cheer up! Cardinal Newman declared that change is a proof of living. Since Vatican II some tragic things have happened. For example, the burial of much of our glorious church music from the centuries; the frequent contestations the pope and the church. especially by priests and Sisters: the setting aside of grace-filled devotions, including the rosary, and pious prayers and processions which are dear to the people: the ransacking of some churches of ecclesiastical furnishings and statues and pictures.

But there have been wonderful changes. For example, the Mass in the vernacular which most people find profitable; the participation of the people in the sacrifice of the Mass: congregational singing. which is quite good in many parishes; the participation of the laity in many ministries of the church. And of great value is the increasing consciousness of the laity that evangelization - i.e., bringing Christ and His church to others - is part of their religious responsibility. And there are striking means to accomplish this: Cursillo. Teen Seminar. retreats. Marriage Enorthodox counter. charismatic groups. And most women are happy about no hats for church: and the Saturday vigil Mass

seems to be widely accepted.

Are you going to Ireland again?

This is the twelfth time I have conducted a tour to Ireland. Last Sunday, in front of the Ithaca church. Sister Campion Bush, SSJ, the principal, introduced me to a charming Sister Mary Ann O'Connor who is studying at Cornell University. "Where are you from, Sister?" I asked. "Sligo in Ireland," she replied. "The only Sister I'know in Ireland is an Ursuline Sister Mary Vianney. We have been pen pals for a dozen years." "Why, she belongs to our community." Sister Mary Ann said. "She is a nurse who is doing fine social work in the Sligo area." I replied, "Well, I expect to meet her at the Shrine of Knock in May, and will bring your greetings." Small world.

How should we go to Confession today? Why don't people go like they used to?

People who have been going to Confession for years should continue to go as they were trained, including the use of the form: last confession time, the specific sins and number of times. I don't know what to say about the young, excepting that few of them know how to make an adequate confession, and perhaps they are uneasy about how to go and what to say. Naturally they hesitate to go. Perhaps Teen Seminar and some of Father David Mura's youth work may help in that regard.

There is a fine album of cassette conferences by Father Bernard Basset. SJ. which clearly presents things our people are concerned about: original sin. the sources of evil. Confession. and the finest talk-I have ever heard on charity. I will be glad to loan it to interested person, or to sell it for \$26.50, postage paid. It is called "Each Man Is an Island." It would be splendid for adult education groups.

Medicare Coverage Expanded

Senior citizens in Monroe County carrying Medicare cards may now have expanded coverages.

Among them:

- The three-day hospital stay for Medicare coverage of admission to a skilled nursing facility is waived in special cases.
- Up to 100 days of home care are provided and all medically necessary daily services paid.
- There is no deductible or co-payment.
- Coverages are in addition to regular Medicare which should be used first.

The home care services include Community Health Nursing, four different kinds of therapy, in-home doctor visits, aide services, medical equipment and supplies, plus needed medical transportation for treatment or therapy. The package can be arranged following a comprehensive assessment and the approval of an ACCESS case manager.

The assessments are available without cost to those qualified. They include a nursing and physician evaluation and a medical workup if necessary, financial counseling, social work visits and an in-home architectural review.

County residents with Medicare cards and long-term health needs may qualify. For further information, the telephone number is 325-6640.


