RACE Annual Dinner Set For April 28

The Rochester Area Career Education Council will host its annual Business/Education/Industry Dinner on Thursday, April 28, at the Rochester Institute of Technology School for Applied Industrial Studies, 50 W. Main St., Rochester. The program will begin with an optional tour of the SAIS facility at 4:30 p.m., followed

by a 5:15 p.m. reception, a 6:30 p.m. program, and a 7:30 dinner.

A multi-image slide presentation will highlight the program and will be followed by the keynote address from Alexander Trowbridge, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, who will speak on "The Business Education Connection: How to Forge the Link Through Private Sector Initiative."
