Poland Trip Offered

The Krakow-Rochester Sister Cities Committee is planning to send two young people interested in Polish language, art, literature and history to study at one of Poland's most prestigious universities in summer 1984.

Scholarships will be awarded for a six-week program at Krakow's Jagiellonian University to two young adults from the Rochester area. The session, organized for American students, covers such topics as Polish history, economics, literature, music, theater, folk art and contemporary problems, as well as language instruction.

This is the third year in a row that the committee has offered the study. Recipients of the 1983 scholarships -Dorothy Koczot, Syracuse University, and Edward Zubrzycki, RIT — will leave for Krakow in July.




