

Cleveland (NC) -- "I don't heal anyone, nor do you," Father Ralph DiOrio, known as "the healing priest," told participants in a healing service in Cleveland. "It is the love of the Lord, the Holy Spirit that does

the healing." Father DiOrio, a 52-year-old priest from Worcester, Mass., has led healing services in parishes throughout the country over the past seven years. He is now director of the the Worcester diocesan Apostolate of Healing.

The sponsor of the services in Cleveland was the Prayer for Healing Ministry of Cleveland, Inc. The sessions took place in the city's Public Hall in early April.

Throughout the services, Father DiOrio called out to people whom he discerned as being healed or needing healing. "Is there a man here whose ear cannot hear? He is here with his wife, and it's his ear on his wife's side," he said at one point. "Think of all his wife's missed conversations. . . Where are you? You are able to hear.'

Near the stage, an elderly man shouts, "Here I am. Praise the Lord - I can hear my wife."

Though some came hoping to receive a healing, Irene J. Walker of St. Mary's Parish in the Cleveland suburb of Chardon, Ohio, was a "skeptic." Her left side has been paralyzed from polio since she was five. After arthritis set in, she said, "my hands and everything hurt so badly. I really couldn't walk more than 10 steps -- and only with a walker -- without crying out in pain."

But at the Saturday April 9 service, Mrs. Warner was one of the people whom the healing priest called.

"I was a skeptic, all right," she said in a telephone interview with the Catholic Universe Bulletin, newspaper of the Cleveland diocese. "I made a point of not looking into his eyes. But afterward, I was just trembling

"When Father called me, and I fell --slain in the Spirit — I floated like a feather, like a cloud.'

Mrs. Warner said that after she stood up, without assistance, that evening, she felt 'wonderful, great. It's hard to find the rights words," she said, adding, "Now I have no more pain. I can walk easily. It's just heavenly. It's God."

But not everyone seeking a healing underwent such a dramatic change as Mrs. Warner. As a woman tried to push another, elderly, woman out of a wheelchair, Father DiOrio said to her, "Don't push anybody into healing. They'll know if they're being healed.'

Speaking to all participants, he said, "Some of you will never get out of your wheelchairs. God may be asking some to look upon and accept their death in urged them all to
