"It has helped me break out of my traditional view on what home life is," she said and added, "it's helped me appreciate mine more.'

Her involvement in sports, she said, has been a way of disciplining herself. "I push a little harder to achieve and it's carried over into the rest of my life.

"Space Artist' Renders Satellites from Salad Bowls" heads an article in the Christian Science Monitor describing Brian Sullivan.

Sullivan, a native Rochesterian and 1972 Bishop Kearney High School graduate, teaches filmmaking at the University of Arizona and is a production designer for the Flandreau Planetarium in Tucson.

Planetariums are not new ground for Sullivan. After receiving a degree in Audio-Visual Technology from the Rochester Institute of Technology in

1976, he worked at the Strasenburgh Planetarium in Rochester and the Smithsonian Planetarium in Washington, D.C.

According to the Christian Science Monitor article, Sullivan is one of the leading artists in the relatively new field of space illustration. In other words, he has a unique way of seeing space hardware — satellites can remind him of a cole slaw container, a deodorant cap or a flower pot - and is able to work his images into realistic and technically correct illustrations.
