Ireland In May?

Our May 3-14 tour of Ireland brought the question: "Why Ireland in May?" May brings out the bright yellow gorse shrubbery shimmering through miles and miles of countryside. May brings the darling new-born lambs and foals gamboling around green, green fields with their mothers.

May is a time when little girls, dressed in immaculate new white dresses and veils, and boys in neat suits and a religious badge are feted by their families.

On Saturday night we stayed at an 1180 A.D. castle, now Kilkea Hotel in County Kildare, where a family — parents, grandparents, brothers, sisters and friends — were celebrating the confirmation of a 13-year-old

eight grade boy. I asked: "How many in the confirmation class?" "Four hundred. But it was not just the local parish, but also children from nearby villages." "How long did it take?" "About three hours." "That's a long session for his Lordship." "Yes, indeed. And for the rest of us." I doubt such an arrangement would be popular in the Rochester diocese.

We were 18 persons. Nine had been on previous trips to Ireland with me. From HORNEWELL: Peg Carey and Mary Thacher of the Presbyterian Church. And Mary Louise Hammond of St. Anne's. From ROCHESTER: Janet Hickey of Blessed Sacrament and her friend,

Helen Glavin of St. Thomas the Apostle; Dorothy Goethels, also of Blessed Sacrament, an Ireland repeater; from Our Lady of Lourdes, William Fisher and his wife, Marie O'Connell of the Mon te z u m a O'Connells. This couple is special to me. They met on our Ireland trip seven years ago, and began their courtship at the most unlikely place, the famous pub called "Durtu Nellie's", next to Bunratty Castle which we were visiting. A year later, Msgr. Leslie Whalen married them at Lourdes, and they have been very happy.

From St. John the Evangelist, Greece, came Mary Louise Garvin,

whose son is technical adviser to Father Wohlrab at Good Counsel. This was her 16th trip to Ireland! From Mother of Hennessy, J. Emmett Hennessy. He had a heart attack in Killarney last year, and spent a month in Bon Secours Hospital, Tralee. From Bethesda, Md., Auburn-born Ellen Ganey, and with her, a young Sister Winifred Welch, a Notre Dame de Namur nun who is in a doctoral program at Boston University.

A much-traveled Hazel Norton, sister of Mrs. Thacher and member of North Yonkers Community Church came from YONKERS. Helen Pratt, the lady lawyer from St. Mary's, DANSVILLE,

arrived, still glowing over a silver award just given to her, made by the Livingston Bar Association for years of dedicated service to the community in legal practice. Supreme Court Judge Joseph Frisch of Sacred Heart Cathedral was the chief speaker and presented the award.

Father James O'Connell of St. Cecilia and St. John, ELMIRA, bought out half the merchandise of Ireland. Mary Jean Epping from St. John's, SPENCERPORT, was thrilled by a visit from friends in Dublin. And finally, Mary Houck, who comes from the smallest village, HONEOYE, and had the largest time of all.

'Peace Candle' Carries Theme Beyond Easter

As the Paschal Candle was extinguished at liturgies last weekend at St. Monica's Church, its flame was used to kindle the fire of a "Peace Candle," which will remain in a prominent place in the church throughout the remainder of the liturgical year.

According to Judy Curtin, a member of the parish liturgy committee, the ceremony was intended "as a call to raise our consciousness." The committee, she said, did not "want to turn off others who might be upset about the

bishops' pastoral, but wanted to be gentle and positive instead of radical."

The rites dovetailed closely with the symbols of the Pentecost celebration, she said.

The Peace Candle will be lit during Sunday, holy day and special liturgies, she said. The action, the committee hopes, will become "something as significant and automatic as making the Sign of the Cross."

In addition, she said that the parish was the site for the Sacrament of Confirmation Pentecost Sunday.

Knights Remember Father Reinhart

Father Joseph Reinhart will be commemorated at the 1983 Fifth New York District Exemplification ceremony, 2 p.m., Saturday, June 4 in Holy Trinity School hall, Webster. Following a 5 p.m. Mass at Holy Trinity, a dinner dance will be held in the new Webster Knights of Columbus Center on Barrett Drive.

Father Reinhart died suddenly last year. He was director of the diocesan Missions Office and was prominent in the area not only for his missions work but also for his civic charitable endeavors.

According to Thomas Grosodonia, K of C spokesman, "Father Reinhart had just joined the Knights of Columbus in 1981 and was truly supportive of the work of the knights on behalf of the Church."

"He had addressed a diocese-wide Finger Lakes Chapter meeting and was instrumental in making it possible for a special Mass for the shut-ins in honor of the knights' centennial."

Father Reinhart would have been a member of this exemplification class.

Natural Planning Education of Rochester is planning a reception to honor Josef Roetzer, MD, from 7:30 to 9 p.m., Friday, May 27, at the Kearney Building Lounge, St. Mary's Hospital. Dr. Roetzer is a former lecturer in pastoral medicine at the universities of Innsbruck, Austria, and Regensburg, Germany, and at the Philosophical-Theological Universities of Linz and St. Poelten, Austria.

He is the director of Marriage Advisory Service in Voeklbruck, Austria, and a World Health Organization consultant on NFP.

A pioneer in NFP research since 1951, he has written works including Family Planning the Natural Way: Fine Points on the Sympto-Thermal Methods, Nos. 1 and 2; Further Evolu-

tion of the Sympto-Thermal Methods, and The Sympto-Thermal Method: Ten Years of Change.

He was adviser to the conference of German-speaking bishops, a full participant in the 1980 Synod on the Family in Rome, and Vatican representative to the 1981 World Congress on Human Reproduction in Berlin.
