Six Years Of Life Lost EDITOR:

I am an inmate at Auburn State Prison and I would like to let young people know that crime and breaking the law does not pay. Crime can only lead to a lonely life, the wrong kind of friends, even life in a cold cell.

Prison is place where people just exist -- in a frustrated, hopeless and often violent world. Believe me for I have spent six years behind these walls. Yes, I have wasted six years of my life for nothing, a good part of my life has been thrown away with nothing to show for it. I am locked in my cell 24 hours a day and I hardly see my loved ones any more. I know that they love me but this place is just so depressing and discouraging to all of them that they don't want to come here any more. I just spend my days writing letters, reading the Bible, praying and, yes, crying uncontrollably.

I pray that everyone has what I have, loving and caring parents. At times, I know, and many youngsters will agree, that parents when try to set us straight and want us to be good citizens, that we often feel that they don't love or care for us, but they do. They may not always show us their love in the best way and may not always have the answers to every thing that we ask, but I know that deep in their hearts they do care.

I know that being in prison can only leave a person marked for the rest of his life and that it does separate him from his family. Even being able to find a good paying job will be hard when an ex-con looks for one. Prison life is lonely and often brutal. Many men who spend most of their time locked up end up going crazy.

I have seen many fights in prison, leaving people hurt or even killed. Youngsters should realize that there is very little freedom in prison to do things -- there is no dating, nor the opportunity to have fun or even get a breath of fresh air when you want. I've seen men grow bitter and develop a bitter attitude toward God and society. Please think about it.

Try to listen to parents, good friends and people in authority because they all care about you. Above all,

Always live your life for Jesus Christ. Stay out of prisons, they are places of horror and graduate schools for future criminals. Anthony Liccione

Father John Dwyer Dies, **Former Rochester Priest**

Doon, Ireland - Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated for Father John F. Dwyer who died here May 10, 1983. Father Dwyer had been incardinated to a number of dioceses including Rochester, N.Y.

Born in Passaic, N.J., he attended St. Bonaventure University, and was accepted as a candidate for the priesthood by Bishop James E. Kearney, then Bishop of Salt Lake City.

He enrolled in the Irish College in Rome for his priestly studies and was ordained in 1935. Continuing in graduate studies, he was awarded a doctorate in Canon Law by the Gregorian University.

When Bishop Kearney was transferred to the Diocese of Rochster in 1937, Father

Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated last week for Sister Mary Amadeus Houston of the Sisters of Mercy who died at 75, May 17,1983.

An Elmira native, Sister Amadeus entered her congregation in 1926 shortly after her conversion to Roman Catholicism.

A graduate of Livonia High School, Sister Amadeus received both a BA and an MA in English from St. Bonaventure University. She also did graduate work at Nazareth College, Canisius College and Georgetown University, taking from the last permanent certification in teaching French. She was also known for her expertise in Latin.

Her teaching career spanned 54 years in schools across the diocese, with 28 years spent at the high school level and 23 at the junior high school level. She was also an elementary school principal for seven years.




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
