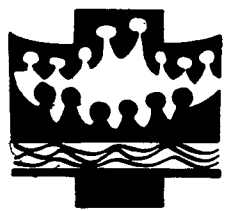

Insights In Liturgy

Veneration/Recessional

The concluding rites of the Mass contain various brief sections, the last of which are the veneration of the altar and recessional. Although these are the last and brief in nature, they continue to add to the tone of the celebration as the People of God are sent forth.

The veneration of the altar at the close of the liturgy mirrors this same action taken at the beginning where the presider greets Christ who is symbolically present in the altar. In the final veneration, the presider bids farewell to Christ. Its meaning as a farewell gesture was gradually obscured by the addition of multiple veneration and additional prayers. Presently the presider approaches the altar, kisses it, bows and then processes out (General Instruction, #125). This gesture, while brief should not be hurried but done in a reverent, deliberate manner.

Following this veneration is the recessional, the departure of the presider and other ministers. Historically, a hymn was never officially a part of this action. Medieval Mass books did contain some texts for this action, but these were private prayers for the priest and were not common prayers for the assembly. Since a recessional song/hymn has never been an official part of this concluding action, a number of options are available (Music in Catholic Worship, #73). Whatever is done at this point of the celebration should help to convey the mood, therefore, careful planning and choice of options will support the celebration whether it has been a festive Easter liturgy or a more introspective Lenten one.

The following are options for consideration:

hymn may be sung which helps convey the meaning of the scriptures of the day; an instrumental piece could be used (this would be especially recommended if the assembly has sung something after communion); the singing group could provide a piece of music; or, it could also be a time for silence (i.e. the conclusion of the liturgy on Good Friday). It is important to remember when planning this segment of the liturgy the nature, mood, and meaning of the liturgical season. Effective use of the recessional can do much to "...send the people of God forth to do good works, praising and blessing the Lord." (General Instruction, #576)
