Kenya Priests Are Fisher Graduates

A request in 1964 from the late Archbishop John J. McCarthy, then archbishop of Nairobi, Kenya, to send

his native priests to St. John Fisher College has resulted in a total of eight graduates from Fisher working in

various areas of Kenya.

Two priests, Father Emmanuel Okombo and Father Peter Lesso, both from Kenya, received their degrees at this year's Fisher commencement. And recently, Father Charles J. Lavery, CSB, chancellor, received word from Fisher graduate Bishop Ralph Ndingi of Nakura, that Pope John Paul II has named Father Peter Kairo of Nakura, also a Fisher graduate, to be bishop of Muranga, which is a new diocese north of Nairobi. Bishop Kairo, who was graduated with a BA in sociology in 1974, was ordained in Kenya on May 21 which coincided with Fisher's commencement.

Bishop Kairo thus joins in the episcopate his classmate Bishop Ndingi and Bishop Nicodemus Kirima of Mombassa, another Fisher graduate, who was ordained bishop in 1974.

Coordinator Named For Pastoral

Washington (NC) -- Sacred Heart Father Brian D. McCullough has been named staff coordinator at the National Conference of Catholic Bishops for the followup to the U.S. bishops' pastoral on war and peace.

He will assist the pastoral followup committee of three bishops headed by Bishop George A. Fulcher of Lafayette, Ind., whose other members are Bishops Kenneth J. Povish of Lansing, Mich., and Kenneth E. Untener of Saginaw, Mich. The committee's responsibility is to encourage dissemination, study and discussion of the pastoral, entitled "The Challenge of Peace: God's Promise and Our Response."

Since 1977, Father McCullough, has been director of the Sacred Heart Fathers' Office of Justice and Peace, at the order's U.S. provincial headquarters, Hales Corners, Wis.

Bus Plunge

Tignale, Italy (NC) -- A parish pilgrimage ended in tragedy on May 24 when a minibus carrying 13 elderly women plunged off a steep embankment in northern Italy, killing all of the women and the driver. The vehicle was descending a narrow, steeply banked mountain road from the Marian shrine of the Madonna of Monte Castello when it smashed through a guard rail and plummeted into a 100-foot-deep ravine.



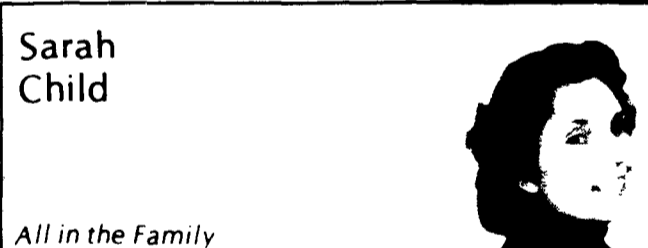
