Father Gianni Novelli, an Italian priest/peace activist, was the guest speaker at an educational forum on nuclear disarmament on Thursday, May 26 at Blessed Sacrament School. The forum, sponsored by the diocesan Nuclear Disarmament Task Force, was attended by over 30 dioceses. Father Novelli, whose visit was coordinated by the International Justice and Peace Commission, joined area Sister Christine Wagner, SSJ, speaking briefly of the Church's part in the nuclear question, then describing the situation in his native country. Father Novelli commented that the Italian people "are not afraid of Soviet attack. . . we are afraid of nuclear war, and the deployment of these nuclear weapons."

Mother Teresa Released From Hospital

Rome (NC) -- Mother Teresa of Calcutta was released June 3 from Salvator Mundi Hospital in Rome where she had been admitted June 1 for what a hospital spokesperson said was a complete medical checkup.

It was Pope John Paul who had suggested the checkup, a church source said.

A member of her religious order, the Missionaries of Charity, said Mother Teresa was "not in good health but feeling better" when she was released.

According to the church source, the 73-year-old Mother Teresa was suffering from exhaustion from recent extensive travels. In May, visits to charitable works conducted by members of her order had taken her from India to Spain, northern Italy and Rome.

She participated in an early morning Mass in Pope John Paul's private chapel at the Vatican May 31. After Mass, said the church source, the pope said that she looked worn out and should have a medical checkup.

Mother Teresa won the 1979 Nobel Peace Prize for her work among the poor and elderly of India.
