Enhancing "parenting" skills, gaining new insights into the person of Jesus, and exploring the "pastoral epistles," 1 and 2 Timothy and Titus, are on the agenda this year for Sacred Heart Cathedral's Fall adult education program, which opens Sept. 27 and 28.

Father Robert Miller, rector, will lead off with "The Pastoral Epistles," 1:30-2:30 p.m., Tuesdays, beginning Sept. 27 in the rectory recreation room.

In six sessions, the class will consider the historical and theological bases the epistles provide for Vatican II's emphasis on collegiality, liturgical reform and lay leadership in the Church. 
