Word for Sunday

Good Will Triumph

Sunday's Readings: (R3) Lk. 17/5-10. (R1) Hb. 1/2-3; 2/2-4. (R2) 2 Tm. 1/1-8, 13-14.

Habakkuk is the daring prophet who dialogues with God. Respectfully, he demands that God explain His strange way of governing the world. Of course Judah has sinned, but Habakkuk wonders why God should punish sinful Judah by evildoers more sinful by far than Judah? Is God on the side of injustice? Habakkuk is preoccupied with the problem of evil, the stumbling block of so many thoughtful men.

Habakkuk is told to write down God's answer. It is this: good shall triumph in the end; the evildoers shall pass away, but the just man shall live, only if he is faithful!

How current the problem is today! Why should the Soviet Union -- perfidious, godless, barbarous -- chastise Christian nations, like all the Captive Nations? How long, O Lord, will she trample down human rights, deceive with her lying propaganda (sometimes, even the elect), fan the fires of violence everywhere? "I cry out to you, 'Violence!' but you do not intervene." Is that true?

God has intervened! Intervened through our Lady at Fatima. Intervened at the very moment that the Bolshevik Revolution was spawning the Communist tyranny. Christ's first coming into the world was through Mary. The new age when Christ will triumph in the world over evil, when He will reign in the minds and hearts of men, will again be ushered in through Mary. The Mother always brings the Son. At Fatima she asked for prayers, the daily rosary, and sacrifices for the conversion of Russia. She did not plead for disarmament, but for the conversion of Russia through moral rearmament, a turning from sin to God.

And she promised, "In the end my Immaculate Heart will triumph." As the vision of Habakkuk climaxed in the coming of Christ, the Prince of Peace, so Mary envisioned at Fatima a similar coming again of her Son into the minds and hearts of people ushering in an era of world peace. Mary's

peace plan is so clear that I cannot for the life of me understand why so many Christians are deceived by peace movements.

St. John said, "Do not trust every spirit, but put the spirits to a test to see if they belong to God, because many false prophets have appeared in the world" (1 Jn. 4/1).

A very important question today is how can one tell whether or not a peace movement is good, and so to be espoused, or evil, and so to be avoided?

The test is simple. It is this: Does the peace movement focus on things or persons? A real peace movement must focus on persons!

Secondly, does the peace movement seek the moral conversion of persons? A real peace movement seeks to bring people to Christ. He alone is the Prince of Peace; He alone can give the peace the world cannot give. That is the test: a focus on persons and their moral conversion.

If a peace movement focuses solely on things: be they bombs or broomsticks, it is a false peace movement and will never bring peace.

If a peace movement attacks Christ and/or Christian morality, it is a false peace movement and will never, never, never, lead to peace, nor bring it. Such peace movements are the proverbial wolves in sheep's clothing. "Peace, peace!" they say, though there is no peace" (Jer. 6/14).

For the cause of war is sin. "Where do the conflicts and disputes among you originate? Is it not your inner cravings that make war within your members?" (James 4/1). And sin resides in persons, not in things!
