Naples Churches Stage Current Issues Program

Naples — "Judge for Yourself," a two-part informational series on nuclear arms and on Central America and Grenada, will be presented by the Naples Council of Churches, 7-9 p.m., Nov. 15 and 22 at the Naples Fire Hall, Main Street. The Nov. 15 session will deal with the nuclear arms race. Two films, "The Last Epidemic," and "Gods of Metal," will be shown. In addition, analyses will be given of the positions of Sens. Moynihan and D'Amato and Rep. Kemp. A time for general discussion will be chaired by Shirley DeHority, vice mod-

erator of the Geneva Pre-sbytery. The second program will focus on Central America and Grenada. Two films, "Guess Who's Coming to Breakfast?" and "The Seeds of Liberty," will be shown, again followed by analyses of current congressional positions and time for general discussion. There will be no admission charge or offering. The programs are open to the general public. "The Last Epidemic" is a 30-minute documentary produced by Physicians for Social Responsibility, detailing the effect of nuclear

attack on the United States and a review of the bombing of Hiroshima. "Gods of Metal," also 30-minutes long, was made under the auspices of Maryknoll Fathers, and probes Roman Catholic response to nuclear arms. "Guess Who's Coming to Breakfast?" is a film-strip and tape about Gulf & Western's presence in the Caribbean, and, by type, the influence of multinational corporations in the third world. "The Seeds of Liberty" is another Maryknoll film, examining social and political conditions in El Salvador.

Nazareth Prof To Speak In UR Series

Prof. Joseph Kelly, associate professor of Religious Studies at Nazareth College and visiting professor at the University of Rochester, will speak on "Christianity and Judaism" at 7:30 p.m., Sunday, Nov. 13, in the Commons Room, middle level of the Interfaith Chapel at the university. The series is sponsored by the Newman Community at UR and is free and open to the public. The final segment on Sunday, Nov. 20, will feature Msgr. William Shannon, professor emeritus and former chairman of Religious Studies at Nazareth College, who will speak on "Christianity and Other World Religions."

DES, Infertility To Be Topic Nov. 14

Dr. Ruth Schwartz will discuss "DES and Infertility" at the next Resolve for Rochester meeting at 8 p.m., Monday, Nov. 14, at the Genesee Hospital Auditorium. The meeting is free and open to the public. Dr. Schwartz, Ob/Gyn, practices in Rochester and has an interest in DES-exposed daughters. For more than 30 years, DES (diethylstilbestrol) was given to women to prevent miscarriages, according to the meeting sponsors. They estimate up to 10 million people were exposed to DES. According to Resolve for Rochester, the offspring of women who took DES during pregnancy have higher incidence of reproductive problems than those not

exposed. DES daughters, Resolve says, have a greater risk of miscarriage, premature babies, adenosis, and infertility. DES-exposed sons experience a wide variety of medical problems, among them lowered potency, Resolve says.
